



## Shooter tackled by teacher

Ind. middle schooler allegedly opens fire in class, hurting student, instructor

NOBLESVILLE, Ind. — An Indiana middle school student armed with two handguns opened fire inside his science classroom Friday, authorities said, wounding a classmate and a teacher whose swift intervention was credited with saving lives.

The shooter, who had asked to be dismissed from the class before returning with the guns, was arrested “extremely quickly” after the incident around 9 a.m. at

Noblesville West Middle School, police Chief Kevin Jowitt said.

Authorities didn’t release his name or say whether he had been in trouble before but indicated he likely acted alone.

Seventh-grader Ethan Stonebraker said the student was acting suspiciously when he walked into the room while the class was taking a test. He said science teacher Jason Seaman likely averted a catastrophe.

“Our science teacher immediately ran at him, swatted a gun out of his hand and tackled him to the

ground,” Stonebraker said. “If it weren’t for him, more of us would have been injured for sure.”

Stonebraker told ABC News that Seaman threw a basketball at the shooter and ran toward the bullets as screaming students sought cover behind a table.

He said he also knew the suspected gunman, whom he described as “a nice kid most of the times” and said he often joked with the classmates.

“It’s just a shock he would do something like that,” Stonebraker said.

The attack comes a week after an attack at a high school in Santa Fe, Texas, that killed eight students

who she is, they pause, holding their phones, debating whether to interrupt.

“When I see them, you know what I say? I say, ‘Come on in. You wanna take a selfie?’” she said.

In the two months since her dizzying ride to international celebrity peaked, the 5-foot-tall team chaplain of the men’s basketball team has had time to reflect. She says she is more relaxed and joyful, willing to set aside work when someone wants to talk about the thrilling season. She even noticed that students seem happier and less stressed during

## Council OKs \$20M for police academy

Foes pack meeting after judge denies attempt to stop vote

Mayor Rahm Emanuel’s signature move to build Chicago police officers a new West Side training academy cleared a key legislative hurdle with ease at a raucous City Council meeting Friday despite opponents’ attempts to halt the vote in court.

After a Cook County judge denied #NoCopAcademy activists’ motion for a temporary restraining order to stop the vote, aldermen and the mayor convened Friday afternoon for a meeting scheduled just two days earlier and passed an ordinance to allow the city to earmark \$20 million from a Goose Island land sale to help pay for the new facility in West Garfield Park. The vote was 39-2.

Before the meeting, activists crowded into the lobby outside the council chambers and voiced their frustration with the proposal to pay \$95 million for the academy rather than funding what they say are more pressing neighborhood concerns.

“We need our tax dollars to support our communities,” said Maria Hernandez of Black Lives Matter Chicago. “You cannot stop crimes of survival without giving people a means to survive. That means jobs.”

And they packed the gallery at the meeting, applauding, shouting and snapping their fingers to show support. During public comment with the mayor and council members looking on, academy opponent Toni Magitt called on African-American aldermen to stand up to Emanuel.

“Black Caucus, come to your senses, back your people for once,” Magitt said. “Because next year all y’all are going to be cleaning out your offices.”

Still, the police academy got overwhelming support from aldermen, as Emanuel predicted it would.

Ald. Emma Mitts, 37th, in whose ward the academy would be built, said protesters “are following an empty hashtag.”

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## Weinstein faces rape charge in New York

Once-powerful movie mogul’s lawyer denies sex assault allegations

NEW YORK — It was the moment the #MeToo movement had been waiting for: Harvey Weinstein in handcuffs.

His face pulled in a strained smile and his hands locked behind his back, the once-powerful Hollywood figure emerged from a police station Friday facing rape and criminal sex act charges, a searing reckoning for the man who became a symbol of a worldwide outcry over sexual misconduct.

“This defendant used his position, money and power to lure

young women into situations where he was able to violate them sexually,” Manhattan Assistant District Attorney Joan Illuzzi-Orbon said later, in words that brought raised eyebrows from the otherwise stony-faced Weinstein.

The charges stem from encounters with two of the dozens of women — some famous, some not — who have accused him of sexual misdeeds. The rape charge involves a woman who has not come forward publicly; the other is a one-time aspiring actress who was among his first accusers.

Weinstein has consistently denied any allegations of nonconsensual sex.

His lawyer, Benjamin Brafman, said Friday that he would fight to get the charges dismissed. And he began to take aim at the

accusations and accusers, noting that the alleged attacks weren’t reported to police when they happened and suggesting potential jurors wouldn’t believe the women.

“Assuming,” he added, “we get 12 fair people who are not

consumed by the movement that seems to have overtaken this case.”

Asked about the raft of other allegations against Weinstein, Brafman said the case was a

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and two teachers and months after the school attack that killed 17 people in Parkland, Fla.

The Florida attack inspired students from that school and others throughout the country to call for more restrictions on access to guns.

Seaman's brother, Jeremy Seaman, told The Indianapolis Star that his brother was shot three times and underwent surgery.

He said he was conscious after the shooting and talked with his wife, telling her he was OK.

Jeremy Seaman, who lives in Arizona, said his brother was a defensive end for Southern Illinois University's football team and has never been a person to run away.

Jason Seaman, 29, a native of Mahomet, Ill., played for the Salukis from 2007 to 2010 and graduated with a degree in elementary education.

He is a science teacher and football coach at No-

blesville West Middle School, according to IndyStar.com.

His mother, Kristi, posted on Facebook on Friday afternoon that her son was shot three times — in the abdomen, hip and forearm — but was doing well after surgery.

Authorities released no information about conditions of the two victims, who were taken to Indianapolis hospitals.

Indiana University Health spokeswoman Danielle Sirilla said the teacher was taken to IU Health Methodist Hospital, and the wounded student was taken to Riley Hospital for Children. She didn't know the seriousness of their injuries.

Hours after the shooting, law enforcement agents sealed off part of an upscale neighborhood in Noblesville but weren't commenting on whether the suspect lived there.

Sandy McWilliams, a member of a landscaping crew working nearby, said six officers toting assault rifles entered a home.

Students were bused to the Noblesville High School gym, where parents and other family members arrived to retrieve them.

Authorities referred to a prompt and heroic response at the school but didn't confirm accounts of the teacher tackling the student or describe the role of the resource officer who was stationed at the school.

When asked to elaborate on his praise of the response, Indiana State Police Superintendent Doug Carter said: "Wait (until) one day we can tell you that story. You'll be proud of them too."

Eighth-grader Chris Navarro said he was inside an auditorium when he heard several gunshots about a minute before the bell rang for the change in classes.

"The speaker came on and said we were on lockdown, and people rushed in, and we went to the back of the room. I went into this little room in the back with three other people," he said calmly standing between

his parents as they picked him up.

Jennifer Morris, who was among the worried parents who rushed to get their kids, appeared slightly dazed and said she was at work when her 14-year-old son sent a text message about the shooting, stunning her.

"He said, 'I'm OK, please come get me.' That was probably 20 minutes after it happened," Morris said. "It's like a bad dream. I don't know how you get the kids through this. This isn't something you're trained for as a parent."

Noblesville, which is about 20 miles northeast of Indianapolis, is home to about 50,000 people.

Indiana's Senate Democrats issued a statement in response to Friday's school shooting expressing their condolences to the victims and calling for steps to prevent such shootings, including restrictions on guns.

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question of crime, not bad behavior.

"Mr. Weinstein did not invent the casting couch in Hollywood," the attorney said.

Weinstein was released on \$1 million bail, with constant electronic monitoring and a ban on traveling beyond New York and Connecticut.

As he surrendered, Weinstein, 66, found himself surrounded by lights and cameras in a spectacle he couldn't control.

"You sorry, Harvey?" came a shout from a throng of media as the once powerful movie mogul was led into a lower Manhattan courthouse.

Asked "what can you say?" Weinstein mildly shook his head and softly said, "no."

Earlier, he lumbered into a police station carrying books that harkened to his show-business roots: one on the Broadway songwriting team of Rodgers and Hammerstein, and another about famed film director Elia Kazan.

During a half-hour in a cell, officials said, he sat on the floor and flipped through the Kazan biography. Later, in a courthouse booking area, he complained he felt faint and his handcuffs were too tight.

The top charges against him carry the potential for up to 25 years in prison.

He's accused of confining a woman in a Manhattan hotel room and raping her in 2013, according to a court complaint.

The criminal sex act charge stems from a 2004 encounter between Weinstein and Lucia Evans, a then-aspiring actress who told The New Yorker magazine he forced her to perform oral sex during a daytime meeting in his office.

"We are relieved and grateful that justice is coming, but we also mourn the cases where it

didn't," her lawyer, Carrie Goldberg, said in a statement.

More than 75 women have accused Weinstein of wrongdoing, and authorities in California and London are also investigating allegations.

New York City police have also been investigating allegations by "Boardwalk Empire" actress Paz de la Huerta, who told police last fall that Weinstein raped her twice in 2010.

Other women who have publicly accused Weinstein of criminal sexual assaults include actress Rose McGowan, who said Weinstein raped her in 1997 in Utah; "Sopranos" actress Annabella Sciorra, who said he raped her in her New York apartment in 1992, and Norwegian actress Natassia Malthe, who said he attacked her in a London hotel room in 2008.

Until the scandal, Weinstein was among the most influential forces in American film. Companies he co-founded were behind such hits as "Pulp Fiction," "Shakespeare in Love" and "The King's Speech."

But there were rumors in Hollywood for years about Weinstein's pursuit of young actresses. And in 2015, an Italian model went to New York City police and accused him of groping her during a meeting.

But Manhattan District Attorney Cyrus Vance Jr. decided not to bring charges, citing a lack of evidence.

Vance said Friday's charges "reflect significant progress in this active, ongoing investigation."

The allegations against Weinstein helped prompt a broad public furor about sexual misconduct.

But on Friday, it was Weinstein in the spotlight. "We got you, Harvey Weinstein," McGowan tweeted. "We got you."

## Medical examiner to review cases

Fired Cook County pathologist's entire work in question

The Cook County medical examiner's office is taking the unusual step of reviewing the entire case-load of a pathologist who was fired the end of last year, so far changing eight findings with nearly 200 cases still to be re-examined.

"They were clerical errors and then there were some errors with his medical findings," medical examiner spokeswoman Becky Schlikerman said of the work by John E. Cavanaugh.

In one case, Cavanaugh's finding of a suicide was changed to undetermined because of questions over how the victim suffered a gunshot wound to the head. In another, his finding of undetermined was changed to homicide after the review found evidence of an assault.

In all, the office plans to review all 219 cases handled by Cavanaugh from the time he was hired in January 2017, at an annual salary of \$250,000, to when he was fired last November. So far the office has examined 23 cases and changed findings in eight of them.

The reviews will not require exhumation of bodies but instead will involve an examination of case files, medical samples, photos and other paperwork, Schlikerman said. The full review is expected to take months.

The Cook County state's attorney's office has been notified because changes in findings could affect disposition of criminal cases. Families are also being contacted.

Errors in Cavanaugh's work had cropped up in the months after he was hired, Schlikerman said. He was demoted from deputy chief medical examiner to assistant medical examiner on July 23, and his salary was lowered to \$228,105.

A peer review of his work was conducted last October and raised more red flags, Schlikerman said.

Cavanaugh was fired effective Nov. 20 and his termination reported to the Illinois Department of Financial and Professional Regulation.

This is the first time that a pathologist's entire body of work has been reviewed by the office, Schlikerman said. The review was first reported by the Chicago Sun-Times.

Among the findings that have been changed so far is the death of a man found after a small fire broke out in an apartment in the 7900 block of South Greenwood Avenue on Oct. 9, 2017. Cavanaugh said he could not make a conclusive ruling on the cause of death, but the review found evidence of injuries from an assault and his death was ruled a homicide.

In another case, Cavanaugh determined that the death of a 20-year-old South Side man shot in the head last September was a suicide. But the review changed the cause to undetermined.

In a third case, Cavanaugh found that a 2-year-old Humboldt Park boy died a natural death on Feb. 23, 2017, citing "anoxic encephalopathy with bilateral lobar pneumonia." But the review changed the cause to undetermined.

Schlikerman credited the office's internal controls for catching the errors. "Our internal review process caught it and that means it worked," she said.

## The look of a hot holiday

But be warned before jumping in the lake — it's cold and can be dangerous

Ashley Novoa finally gave in Friday after her son's repeated requests to have a beach day.

She considered letting 3-year-old Jack Alison dip only his toes into Lake Michigan because she suspected the water hadn't had a chance to warm up enough for swimming.

"I wanna go all the way in," Jack said, holding his bucket of toys.

"He has other plans," Novoa said as she laughed.

Her instincts were spot-on.

Chicago Fire Department and National Weather Service officials warned swimmers to think before jumping into the lake Memorial Day weekend, the official start of beach season in Chicago. Lake Michigan's water temperature near the Chicago shore was 57 degrees Friday. The water had warmed up 17 degrees since March 4, when Chicago Special Olympics held its Polar Plunge and the water was 40 degrees.

Ron Dorneker, deputy district chief for the Fire Department's marine and dive unit, said the department wants to cut down

the number of water rescues this year and urged the public to not be fooled by warm air temperatures.

The department last season responded to about 200 water rescue calls and pulled out an estimated 100 people from local waters. Swimming in cold water, generally any water below 70 degrees, is dangerous because it can cause hypothermia or cause someone to drown, Dorneker said.

"So water temperature in the 50s is going to zap your strength when you swim," he said. "Think about when you go to a Chicago Park District pool; those pool temperatures are typically about 80 degrees. So we're looking at a water temperature almost 25 degrees less than that."

Jumping into cold water can cause a person to reflexively gasp, then get water in their lungs, according to the National Weather Service. Hypothermia typically happens when a person's body temperature drops below 95 degrees.

But even in warmer water, how long someone stays in the water can

factor into someone developing hypothermia, said Eric Anderson, a physical oceanographer with the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration.

It may be cold, but the lake near the Chicago shore is actually 3 degrees warmer than it was this time last year, Anderson said. And Friday's water temperature was about the same as in 2016, he said.

How soon the lake warms depends on ice cov-

erage, air temperatures and how many sunny days Chicago gets, Anderson said. And the water temperatures might vary depending on what side of Lake Michigan you are on, he said.

The lake's temperature is even affected by the direction of the wind. Winds coming from the north and the east warm up the lake because they cause waves that send surface water that is typically

warmer toward Chicago's shoreline, Dorneker said. But winds traveling from the south and west blow warm surface water out and away from the city, bringing in water from the bottom of the lake that is colder, he said.

Heavy winds can cause water temperature to drop by 10 degrees within 10 to 12 hours, Dorneker said. But even if the area gets winds from the north and the east this weekend, it will not do much to warm up the lake because the surface water isn't as warm as during the months of July or August, Anderson said.

While the lake was expected to stay chilly, outside temperatures are a different story. On Friday, the high hit 88 degrees at O'Hare and Midway airports, with lakefront temperatures hitting 86, while the highs for Saturday and Sunday are expected to be in the 90s, according to the weather service. The forecast high for Memorial Day was 90 degrees.

If beachgoers can't stifle the temptation to cool off in

the water, they should make sure a lifeguard is present, Dorneker said. Parents should watch their children carefully, and those on boats should wear life jackets, he said.

By Friday morning, North Avenue Beach was starting to get crowded with people sunbathing, eating lunch and playing volleyball. Three men in waist-deep water tossed a Frisbee to each other. Des Plaines residents Arsalan Afshar, 18, and Kristian Dankov, 18, were meeting up with friends at the beach. Both had their swim trunks on and were going to take their chances taking a dip.

"You get used to it," Dankov said. "Obviously, if you're still shivering, it's too cold."

But other beachgoers like Jamie Rinaldi, 21, of Edison Park, had no plans to get in the water. She was at North Avenue for a photo shoot and also regularly does yoga at the beach.

"Definitely not today," Rinaldi said about swimming in Lake Michigan. "It's way too cold for that. In August or July? Yeah."

## Police drone surveillance bill shot down by House

SPRINGFIELD — A plan to give police more power to use drones to watch over large public events was rejected by the Illinois House on Friday, as lawmakers try to balance public safety with personal privacy.

The bill fell six votes short on the House floor. Democratic state Rep. John D'Amico of Chicago cited low attendance and said he might try for another vote as early as next week.

Supporters, including Mayor Rahm Emanuel's administration, contend police need additional tools to keep an eye on large gatherings in response to the threat of mass shootings. Critics like the American Civil Liberties Union say the proposed law is too broad, constitutes a major invasion of privacy and could dissuade activists from expressing their First Amendment rights to peacefully assemble.

At issue for some Chicago Democrats is the way the proposal defines large events. Under the bill, po-

lice could use drones to watch over private or public gatherings of more than 100 people when they are on public property and law enforcement uses it for a "legitimate public safety purpose."

The measure would amount to an expansion of how police departments would be allowed to use drones four years after lawmakers first put restrictions in place. Now, police can use them in certain circumstances, including when there has been a threat of a terrorist attack, a natural or public health disaster, or a missing person.

African-American lawmakers were key to Fri-

day's result, with most voting "no." State Rep. Andre Thapedi raised concerns over the proposed law's scope, saying it could permit invasive surveillance practices on the South Side at events like block parties and family reunions within public view.

"I know this is going to be an abused process — especially on the South Side of Chicago," Thapedi said. "I already know it's going to happen."

Similar concerns were raised earlier this month when the measure cleared the Senate.

final exams — a very different mood from previous years.

She certainly has brought joy to the Sisters of Charity of the Blessed Virgin Mary, her order based in Dubuque, Iowa. The organization reports that contributions in March and early April tied directly to Sister Jean totaled about \$20,000. Several thousand dollars more has come in through other gifts with Sister Jean links, an order spokesman said.

Along the way, Sister Jean collected a few fun stories, like when she chatted with sports legend Charles Barkley, now a basketball analyst on TV, before an interview.

"I said, 'Charles, You're a great reporter,'" she recalled. "You do your homework. You know what you're talking about. You're great on the TV, but when you were a player, you never smiled, and I thought that was a disservice to young people who are passionate about their sport."

"I could have said, 'You were angry all the time,'" Sister Jean recalled, "but I didn't want to say that the first time I meet a person."

### Happy making others happy

She's still trying to fathom how she became so popular, how her fame "exploded" so abruptly, how she became a bobblehead. She also acknowledged that, at nearly 100 years old, she probably has become a different person now, more aware of the importance of words and actions.

"I'm just learning a lot about myself too," she said. "I'm learning that I can accept this without getting bigheaded. I go with the flow. People say, 'Oh, Sister Jean, how do you handle all this?' I just go with the flow."

A basketball player and coach decades ago and a student of the game to this day, Sister Jean has been a campus fixture since 1961. She retired from full-time work in 1991 and became team chaplain about the same time. Her home is a dorm room. She gets around in a wheelchair.

Her vault from beloved campus figure to plain-spoken global charmer began about three months ago, shortly after the Loyola basketball team's similarly improbable tournament run began.

Starting in early February, the Ramblers won 14 consecutive games, dancing their way through the NCAA postseason tournament with surprising poise and exhilarating last-second shots. Their season ended March 31, when Michigan beat them one game from college basketball's national championship.

Sister Jean's cheerful, plucky optimism resonated early as the team's goodwill ambassador. She was more than happy to abide everyone who asked for a moment of her time.

She said she wanted to do more, but bodyguards cut short her public availabilities.

"Their chief task was not to make my photography sessions too long," said Sister Jean, who fielded enough photo ops to make a Manhattan runway model jealous. "And I said, 'Don't worry. I can do that. I'm making the people happy.' What's taking a picture? That's not making me tired. It's making me happy because I'm making others happy."

People asked for her prayers and blessings, particularly for relatives and friends who were ill, she said. She honored those requests. Many asked for autographs and selfies. She tried to honor those, too, until her handlers stepped in.

"I just had such a great time," Sister Jean said, "and now I continue to have a great time."

The fun stretched into early May, when she was invited to Springfield to provide an invocation in the General Assembly and met Gov. Bruce Rauner.

"He was much better personally than he is on TV," she recalled. "I guess he has a lot to worry about."

### Staffers have to draw the line

Requests keep coming, and she stays busy. Items on her desk that morning included a marked-up day planner, her plans for freshman orientation, a copy of an upcoming invocation — lately she's been receiving applause after giving them. Perched on a nearby case was a bobblehead — not her own, but one depicting Cardinal Blase Cupich.

Among the items people have asked her to autograph are blank 3-by-5 notecards and basketballs. Two staffers in Loyola's athletic department screen and almost universally reject the requests. The concern, Sister Jean said, is that the materials would be used inappropriately for

profit or other purposes.

"It's easier for me to say no than it is for me to say no," she said. "I haven't learned to say that yet."

Even if she says no from this day forward, the Sister Jean impact has been felt.

During March and early April, 24 donors from 11 states made gifts in honor of Sister Jean, said Andy Schroeder, director of development for the Blessed Virgin Mary order, commonly known as BVMs. The organization also is receiving proceeds from Sister Jean bobblehead sales, he said.

In addition, a couple of offbeat fundraisers in Chicago brought several thousand dollars to the BVMs, Schroeder said. Nisei Lounge, a Wrigleyville institution, raised \$1,000 through a "charity kegger" during Loyola's Final Four game. Chicago sports enthusiast Mike Schaefer sold T-shirts printed with "Sister Jean's Mission from God" and sent more than \$1,000 in proceeds to the BVMs, Schroeder said.

The order also reported that Elle Hagedorn, a former Harvard basketball player, "was so moved by Sister Jean and the BVMs" that she started an online crowdfunding drive that raised nearly \$3,000 for the Big Shoulders Fund, which supports Catholic schools in Chicago's neediest communities, largely through scholarships to low-income students.

Sister Jean said she is proud of that impact and excited about the Ramblers' future.

"I could go back tomorrow and start all over again for next season," she said, noting that several stars from this year's team will return.

If next season unfolds like this one, she could find herself chatting again with Barkley, who seemed to have taken her observations in the proper spirit.

"You know what he said to me?" she recalled. "I'll keep smiling. I thought that was really nice."

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## Police center clears key hurdle

"The Department of Justice recommended it, and the city needs it. Not only is it the right thing to do for the city, it's the right thing for the West Side," Mitts said.

Ald. Nicholas Spasato, 38th, brought blue "Yes" balloons into the council chambers, which he released in the air as he cast what he said was his "easiest yes vote in years."

Voting against the academy spending ordinance were Ald. Carlos Ramirez-Rosa, 35th, and Ald. Ricardo Munoz, 22nd.

The activists — who have organized around the #NoCopAcademy hashtag — filed a lawsuit Wednesday, arguing the council Budget Committee violated state law when its chairman, Ald. Carrie Austin, 34th, didn't give opponents a chance to testify against the proposal before the committee voted on it Tuesday morning.

They followed with a motion for a temporary restraining order seeking to stop Emanuel and aldermen from proceeding with Friday's vote on the issue, contending there must be a proper Budget Committee hearing on the ordinance before that could take place.

Cook County Circuit Judge Celia Gamrath refused to grant the "extraordinary protection" of a temporary restraining order, saying she did not find compelling enough evidence that the council would be violating the state's open meetings law if it went ahead. The activists' lawsuit will proceed in front of Gamrath.

The planned \$95 million facility in West Garfield Park has quickly become one of the flashpoints in Emanuel's efforts to enact changes at the Chicago Police Department following the Laquan McDonald shooting and a scathing Justice Department report on department training and tactics.

The mayor sees the new facility as a key to modernizing the police force while providing a community anchor in a long-struggling part of the West Side. But the #NoCopAcademy activists contend the money would be better spent on programs that would directly benefit residents, such as job training, childhood education and mental health services.

Speaking before the judge's ruling on the temporary restraining order, Emanuel said he was confident of the city's legal position and returned to touting how much support the police academy enjoys: "Every member of the West Side, let alone the City Council, voted for this for a reason. And if I did a secret ballot, they all would have put down their own ward."

But opponents have been relentless in making their case, demonstrating loudly at various council hearings and even heckling the mayor or about the need for the spending when he has appeared this year to talk to students at the University of Michigan and other out-of-state campuses.

The movement got some star power in November when Chance the Rapper, whose given name is Chancellor Bennett, spoke out against the academy project during the public comment portion of a City Council meeting. "It doesn't make sense. I'm very confused. But like I said, you guys have a lot of power, and that's why I showed up at 8 a.m., because I feel like it's — maybe if you guys just hear me say it. I'll take pictures with everybody afterward if you want me to," Bennett said.

His appearance didn't stop the council from approving the \$10 million land sale for the academy that same day. The vote was 48-1, a tally Emanuel has repeatedly mentioned recently.

Aldermen were set to vote Wednesday on the ordinance giving the city authority to transfer \$20 million from the sale of a lot near Goose Island to help pay for the proposed academy in West Garfield Park.

Before that could happen, two aldermen used a parliamentary procedure to delay the vote until the next council meeting, a tactic opponents of particular is-

## 5 things to know

### 1. Supporters say the academy is an investment that will help reform the Police Department

News of the proposal followed a critical report from the U.S. Department of Justice about Police Department tactics, citing out-of-date training procedures for recruits at the police academy.

Mayor Rahm Emanuel and his supporters say the new public safety training center is a necessary replacement for separate police and fire academies, both more than 40 years old, so that up-to-date training can be offered in a modern facility. But it has also been viewed as a response to the spotlight on police misconduct following the police shooting of Laquan McDonald.

At the same time, there have been too few investments on the West Side for far too long, supporters say. And the academy could help offset that inequity.

### 2. How the city plans to pay for the project

The center would include indoor and outdoor training spaces as well as offer more joint training opportunities, the city has said. The academy would be named for slain Cmdr. Paul Bauer, who was shot in the line of duty in February.

There's been strong support for the training center among aldermen. An earlier purchase of the land for the academy passed the council 48-1, approving paying \$10 million for 30 vacant acres.

The lingering question is how the city will pay for the project. In addition to the \$10 million for the land, Emanuel plans to use \$20 million from the sale of land near Goose Island — the subject of Friday's vote — and an additional \$5 million from the sale of a River North firehouse. The mayor hopes to get at least \$23 million from selling other police and fire training buildings, according to David Reynolds, commissioner of the city Department of Fleet and Facility Management.

That means there's still about \$37 million needed.

### 3. The surprising delay at City Hall

At Wednesday's City Council meeting, Northwest Side Ald. Carlos Ramirez-Rosa, 35th, and South Side Ald. David Moore, 17th, used a procedural move to delay a vote until next month's meeting. Emanuel ordered aldermen to return for a vote on Friday — an unusual move that was challenged in a Thursday lawsuit. Ramirez-Rosa said he delayed the vote to draw attention to opponents' calls that the city spend the millions elsewhere. The measure passed anyway.

### 4. The demands of #NoCopAcademy

Groups of young protesters have led the charge against the facility. In March, members of the activist group #NoCopAcademy staged a "die-in" at City Hall. "Rahm supports schools and resources for cops, not for Black and Brown kids," their mission statement reads. The group calls for funding to go instead toward schools and mental health centers, as well as after-school and job-training programs.

Chance the Rapper has spoken out against the academy, appearing last fall at the council meeting where the land purchase was approved, and tweeting regularly about the proposal. Protesters also have disrupted Emanuel speeches at prestigious universities this year.

### 5. Cops have lashed out but not over academy

Despite Emanuel's plans for the academy, some Chicago cops think the mayor has turned his back on them. More than 100 off-duty officers marched at City Hall during Wednesday's council meeting and called for Emanuel's removal from office.

Some officers say the mayor's endorsement of a federal consent decree overseeing police reform means he's cast their interests aside. The mayor has also not yet agreed to a new contract — almost a year after the union's last one expired.

"Rahm must go! Back the blue!" they chanted, while carrying "Blue Lives Matter" signs.

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sues sometimes use to give themselves more time to try to sway their colleagues to their side. In this case, Ramirez-Rosa said he deferred it because he wanted the academy opponents to have a chance to be heard. He was joined Wednesday by Ald. David Moore, 17th, who said he needed more information about the funding. Moore voted in favor of the ordinance Friday.

Rather than wait for the next regular meeting in late June to vote, Emanuel took the rare step of immediately adjourning the Wednesday meeting and setting another one for Friday.

The mayor said he did so because he wants to get moving on a project West Side residents want and the council overwhelmingly supports. "Not one vote will be changed" by the delay, he predicted after the Wednesday council meeting.

In the end, Munoz was the only one who switched from a yes on the academy land sale to a no on Friday's financing measure. He declined comment on his vote.

Also Friday, the council adopted Ald. Brendan Reilly's ordinance to require fiscal analysis reports for many proposals that would affect the city's bottom line. Reilly says he thinks the new rule will give aldermen more information to avoid voting in favor of ideas that could be financially disastrous for the city.

Friday was also the last council meeting for retiring Ald. Michael Zalewski, 23rd, who was first elected in 1995 after a long career in the city's Department of Streets and Sanitation. Emanuel is set to name his replacement before the next council meeting, with Michael Madigan ally state Rep. Silvana Tabares considered the front-runner. Emanuel also will name someone on the council to succeed Zalewski as chairman of the Aviation Committee.

## On Korea talk, players get Take 2

Day after canceling summit, Trump says it may be back

WASHINGTON — A day after accusing North Korea of “open hostility” and calling off a June 12 summit with its leader Kim Jong Un, President Donald Trump said Friday that talks with Pyongyang had resumed and expressed cautious optimism that the meeting could be held after all.

“We’ll see what happens. It could even be the 12th,” Trump told reporters as he left the White House to give the commencement address at the U.S. Naval Academy.

“We’re talking to them now. They very much want to do it. We’d like to do it.”

The about-face followed a conciliatory statement by Kim’s government saying it regretted Trump’s action and remained willing to talk. The president called it “a very nice statement.”

But the exchange did little to clarify the highly charged situation and instead underscored the mixed messages and unpredictability on both sides.

They remain far apart on the central issue of North Korea’s nuclear arsenal: Trump demands Kim completely and irreversibly give up his program, while North Korea considers its weaponry and ballistic missile capability essential for its survival.

Officials cautioned that the latest burst of hopefulness does not ensure the summit will happen.

Asked by reporters on

Friday if he was optimistic, Defense Secretary James Mattis said, “I am optimistic that the diplomats are working, our diplomats are working very hard to make this happen.”

The most important factor in salvaging the summit may be the stake that Trump and Kim have in holding a face-to-face meeting, even if it falls short of achieving a major breakthrough.

“Kim wants to meet with Trump to give him status. Trump wants to meet with Kim so he will be the center of global attention,” said Jon Wolfsthal, director of the anti-proliferation Nuclear Crisis Group and a former

Obama administration official.

The possibility that the summit will be saved likely reassured South Korea, whose president, Moon Jae-in, has worked to coax Trump and Kim to the negotiating table.

Moon, who had visited the White House Tuesday to buttress the case for the Trump-Kim meeting, was taken by surprise by Trump’s cancellation two days later.

Secretary of State Mike Pompeo on Friday tried to mend fences. He phoned his South Korean counterpart, Kang Kyung-wha, to reaffirm the two governments’ “shared commit-

ment” to denuclearize the Korean peninsula, the State Department said.

“They committed to remaining closely coordinated in all of their efforts to create conditions for dialogue with North Korea and agreed that must continue until North Korea embraces denuclearization,” the department said in a statement.

A White House advance team scheduled to go to Singapore, the planned location for the summit, has not canceled its trip.

“We have got some possibly good news on the Korea summit,” Mattis told reporters, calling the confusion between Trump and

North Korea the “usual give-and-take.”

That description is contrary to the reaction of many diplomacy and national security experts, who have expressed consternation at the administration’s handling of the high-stakes dealings with North Korea.

Analysts said the back-and-forth over whether the meeting will occur should temper expectations about what the summit will achieve.

U.S. officials have called for North Korea to take unilateral steps to eliminate its nuclear arsenal and limit its ballistic missiles.

But Pyongyang appears to favor phased concessions

by both sides, with its gradual steps matched by U.S. economic assistance and assurances that it will not seek to oust Kim.

“Bridging this fundamental gap will be difficult if not impossible ... unless one or both sides align their expectations and rhetoric with this reality,” said Patricia M. Kim, an expert in Korean nuclear negotiations at the Council on Foreign Relations.

A senior administration official who briefed reporters on condition of anonymity Thursday outlined what he called “a trail of broken promises” from North Korea. Among them, Pyongyang’s team for negotiating summit details didn’t show up for a planning meeting with U.S. officials in Singapore less than two weeks ago, the official said.

“We weren’t getting the right signals previously, so hopefully we will in the future,” State Department spokeswoman Heather Nauert told reporters at the Naval Academy graduation ceremony. “But we didn’t want to go to a meeting just for the sake of going to a meeting. There had to be something to come out of it.”

Mattis said there had been no change in the U.S. military’s alert posture in response to the new uncertainty about the summit.

“It is steady as she goes,” Mattis said. “The diplomats are in the lead and in charge, and we give them our best wishes to have a fruitful way forward.”

### Iran seeks assurances on nuclear deal after U.S. pullout

VIENNA — Iran will pull out of a landmark deal to stop the country from developing nuclear weapons unless it receives concrete guarantees that the economic incentives of the pact will be protected by the other parties, following the U.S. decision to unilaterally withdraw and Washington’s threat of sanctions against companies who trade with Iran, a senior Iranian official said Friday.

The other countries in-

involved in the JCPOA, the so-called Joint Comprehensive Plan of Action Joint Commission, met Friday for the first time without the U.S. after Iran called for an urgent meeting of the body in Vienna.

Britain, France, Germany, China and Russia reaffirmed their commitment to the deal, and the Iranian delegation emerged saying they were more confident than before, and made no mention of timelines.

### Oklahoma police: Restaurant gunman had no criminal record

OKLAHOMA CITY — The man suspected of shooting three people inside an Oklahoma City restaurant before being fatally shot by bystanders had no criminal record or obvious connection to the victims or the restaurant, police said Friday.

Oklahoma City Police Capt. Bo Mathews said investigators were trying to find a motive behind the Thursday attack that injured four people.

Mathews said the shooting appeared to be random but noted that the suspected gunman, 28-year-old Alexander Tilghman, drove to the restaurant and wore protective gear for his ears and eyes.

A 39-year-old woman and two girls were shot and wounded, while an unarmed man broke his arm while trying to flee. All four victims were in good condition Friday, according to police.

### Russian billionaire met with Cohen before the inauguration

WASHINGTON — President Donald Trump’s personal attorney, Michael Cohen, met at Trump Tower in New York days before the 2017 inauguration with a Russian billionaire who was sanctioned this year by the U.S. government.

The meeting between Cohen and Viktor Vekselberg, who made his fortune in the energy industry, was an impromptu session arranged by Vek-

selberg’s cousin, Andrew Intrater, an investment manager who was also in attendance, according to a person with knowledge of the encounter.

Later that month, Cohen signed a lucrative consulting contract with Intrater’s investment firm, Columbus Nova. Company officials have said Vekselberg, who is Columbus Nova’s biggest client, played no role in Cohen’s hiring.

### Canadian police seek 2 after bomb wounds 15 at restaurant

TORONTO — Investigators were seeking two suspects Friday after an explosion caused by a homemade bomb ripped through an Indian restaurant at a mall in the Toronto suburb of Mississauga, wounding 15 people, Canadian police said.

Police said two people with their faces covered to conceal their identity entered the Bombay Bhel restaurant late Thursday, dropped the improvised explosive device and fled. Peel Regional Sgt. Matt Bertram said an object resembling a pail or paint can was carried by one of the

suspects in his hand into the crowded restaurant where children were present.

“There is no indication that this is a terrorism act. There is no indication that this is a hate crime at this time. We haven’t ruled anything out as we start our investigation,” said Peel Regional Police Chief Jennifer Evans.

Peel police said Friday all the injured have been released from the hospital. Officials initially said three Indian-Canadians suffered critical injuries and were being treated while the remaining 12 victims suf-

fered what Evans described as minor and superficial injuries. The ages of the injured range from 23 to 69. Children under the age of 10 were present but were not hurt.

The explosion happened just after 10:30 p.m. Thursday.

Police released a photo of the suspects, both with dark hoods pulled over their heads and their faces covered.

Police described the first suspect as someone in his mid-20s with a stocky build. The second suspect was described as a little shorter with a thin build.

### Guilty plea in USS McCain collision court-martial

WASHINGTON — The officer in command of the USS John S. McCain when it collided with an oil tanker near Singapore in August 2017, killing 10 sailors, has pleaded guilty to dereliction of duty, the Navy said Friday.

Cmdr. Alfredo Sanchez entered his plea during

court-martial proceedings at Washington’s Navy Yard.

The Navy said the formal charge to which Sanchez pleaded guilty was “negligent dereliction of duty resulting in death.”

Sanchez was sentenced to a letter of reprimand and forfeiture of \$2,000 a month in pay for three

months. As part of a plea deal, he will request to retire, the Navy said.

At another court-martial Thursday, boatswain’s mate Chief Petty Officer Jeffery Butler pleaded guilty to dereliction of duty. His role aboard the McCain was certifying sailors on the navigation system.

### Mo. governor gets subpoena in probe on impeachment

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo. — Missouri Gov. Eric Greitens has been subpoenaed to testify before a legislative panel weighing whether to try to impeach and remove him from office over allegations of sexual misconduct and political fundraising violations, the committee announced Friday.

The subpoena to testify June 4 comes amid mounting tensions between the governor’s legal team and the special House committee that has been investigating allegations against him since March but is now facing a mid-June deadline for the House to act on any impeachment recommendation.

Greitens has so far declined to testify, though his attorneys have indicated he could after his criminal cases on charges of tampering with computer data and invasion of privacy are resolved.

The eldest son of former Republican vice presidential candidate Sarah Palin is seeking to bar the media from covering court hearings after he was accused of assaulting his father last year.

A lawyer for Track Palin, 29, filed a motion Friday to prohibit or limit media access to proceedings in Veterans Court.

State fire officials blame power lines coming into contact with trees for sparking four Northern California wildfires last October that incinerated more than 130 buildings. In a statement released Friday, officials indicated three of the fires could have been prevented had more efforts been made to clear power lines of trees.

# Ireland poised to lift strict ban on abortion

Official vote counts for referendum expected Saturday

DUBLIN — Two major exit polls have projected that Irish voters have repealed a constitutional ban on abortions.

The exit polls by RTE television and the Irish Times both project a landslide victory for the “yes” forces seeking to liberalize the strict abortion ban.

The RTE poll projects support will reach nearly 70 percent. The exit polls are only projections. Official vote counts are expected Saturday afternoon.

Catherine Murphy, co-leader of the small Social Democrats party, said the exit polls “are strongly indicating that voters have taken on board the clear message that the constitutional ban harms women” and must be removed from the constitution.

The exit polls suggest strong support in virtually all parts of the country for repealing the ban.

If the “yes” vote is confirmed, Ireland’s parliament will be tasked with writing new regulations on abortion.

Ireland’s referendum Friday represented more than a vote on whether to end the country’s strict abortion ban.

It also was a battle for the very soul of a traditionally conservative Roman Catholic nation that has seen a wave of liberalization in

recent years. The country’s leaders supported a “yes,” an outcome that would repeal a 1983 constitutional amend-

ment requiring authorities to treat a fetus and its mother as equals under the law.

They called it a once-in-

a-generation opportunity to liberalize some of Europe’s strictest abortion rules.

Voters went to the polls after a campaign that aroused deep emotions on both sides.

For advocates of repeal, a “yes” vote was a landmark in Irish women’s fight for equality and the right to control their own bodies. For opponents, it was a betrayal of Ireland’s commitment to protect the unborn.

The vote also was a key indicator of Ireland’s trajectory, three years after the country voted to allow same-sex marriages and a year after its first openly gay prime minister took office.

Emma Leahy said her “yes” vote came from her firm belief that everyone should be able to make their own choice when it comes to abortion.

“For Ireland, it’s hope for the future,” she said of the referendum. “Whether you agree or disagree, it shouldn’t be the government or anyone else making that decision.”

Vera Rooney voted against repeal.

“It is a hard decision, but I just feel I don’t have the right to take life,” she said. “I think life is sacred and for that reason I had to vote no.”

## White House, China’s ZTE said to have deal

Source familiar with talks says Congress notified

WASHINGTON — The Trump administration has told Congress that it’s reached a deal that would allow Chinese telecommunications giant ZTE Corp. to stay in business, a source familiar with the talks who spoke on condition of anonymity to discuss a confidential matter said Friday.

A resolution of the ZTE case could clear the way for the United States to make progress in its high-stakes trade talks with China.

But news of the agreement drew immediate fire on Capitol Hill.

Under the agreement, ZTE would oust its management team, hire American compliance officers and pay a fine.

The fine would come on top of the roughly \$1 billion ZTE has already paid for selling equipment to North Korea and Iran in violation of U.S. sanctions.

In return, the Commerce Department would lift a seven-year ban on ZTE’s purchase of components that the Chinese firm depends on from U.S. companies.

The ban, imposed earlier this month, threatened to put ZTE out of business.

The Commerce Department did not respond to a call seeking confirmation of the agreement. On Capitol Hill, one senior congressional source said leaders have not yet received formal notification.

Lawmakers have warned the administration not to go easy on a company that violated U.S. sanctions against two rogue nations pursuing nuclear weapons production.

“If the administration goes through with this reported deal, President Trump would be helping make China great again,” said Democratic Sen. Chuck Schumer of New York.

“Both parties in Congress should come together to stop this deal in its tracks.”

“ZTE presents a national security threat to the United States — and nothing in this reported deal addresses that fundamental fact,” said Sen. Chris Van Hollen, D-Md. “If President Trump won’t put our security before Chinese jobs, Congress will act on a bipartisan basis to stop him.”

Republican Sen. Marco Rubio of Florida tweeted: “It is a great deal for #ZTE & China Many hoped this time would be different.”

Rubio said Congress “will need to act.”

The Commerce Department last month blocked China’s ZTE from importing American components for seven years, having concluded that ZTE deceived U.S. regulators after it settled charges last year of violating sanctions against Iran and North Korea.

The ban amounted to a virtual death sentence for ZTE, which relies on U.S. parts, and it also hurt ZTE’s U.S. suppliers.

On the eve of broad trade talks last week with a Chinese trade envoy, Trump waded into the ZTE case: He tweeted that he was working with President Xi Jinping to put ZTE “back in business, fast” and save tens of thousands of Chinese jobs.

He later tweeted that the ZTE talks were “part of a larger trade deal” being negotiated with China.

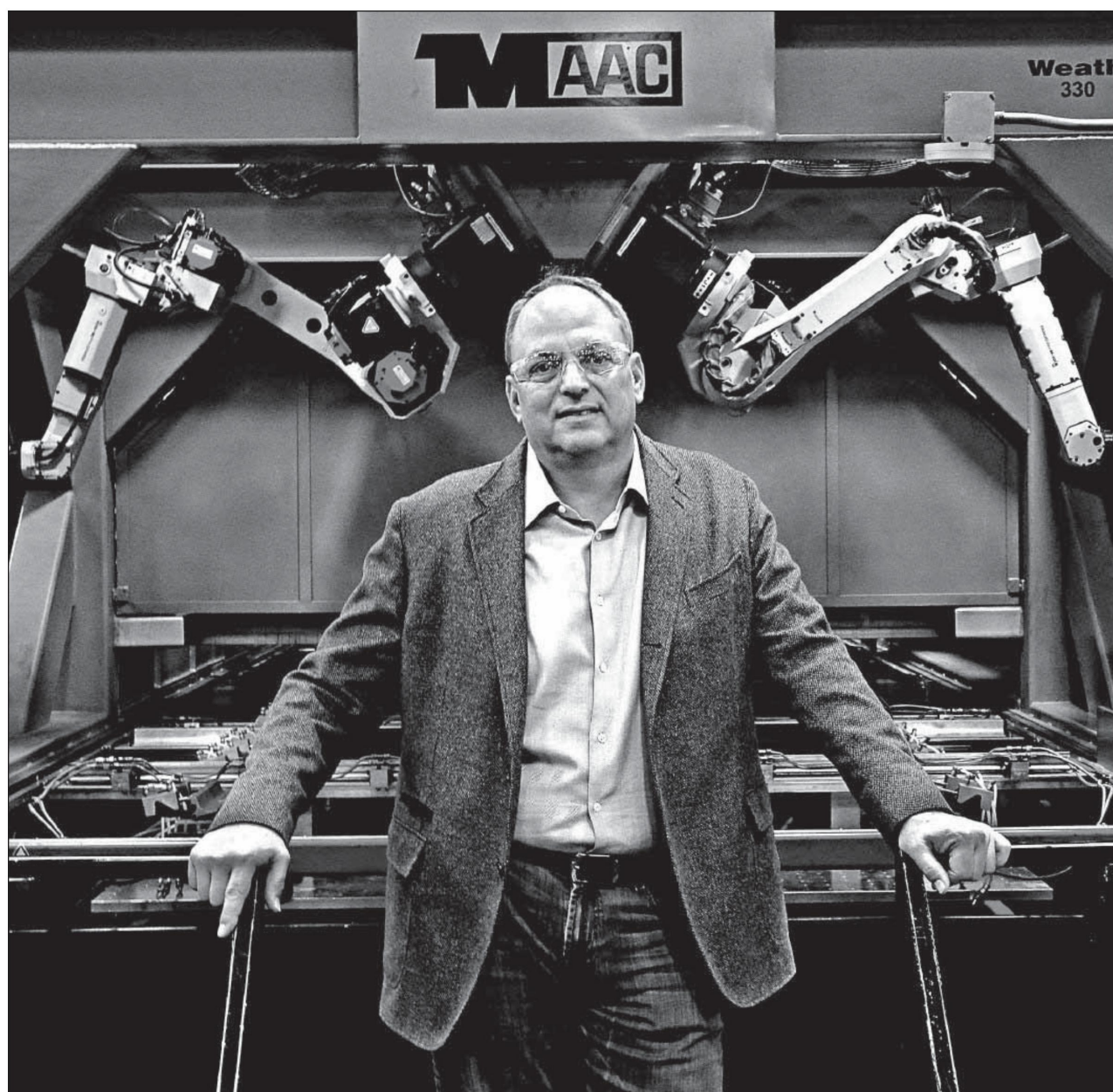
Word of a reported ZTE agreement comes nearly a week after the U.S. and China suspended plans to impose tariffs on as much as \$200 billion of each other’s goods.

In doing two, the two nations pulled back from the brink of a trade war over Chinese demands that U.S. companies hand over some of their technology as the price of doing business in China.

Commerce Secretary Wilbur Ross is scheduled to travel to Beijing on June 2 for further discussions over China’s aggressive push to challenge U.S. technological dominance.

Resolving the ZTE case — a company that employs more than 70,000 Chinese — could make the talks go more smoothly.

## Top Trump donor wants DACA immigration fix

WeatherTech founder to cut off GOP funding for those who don't back legislation

Frustrated by congressional gridlock, WeatherTech founder David MacNeil, a megadonor to Donald Trump's inauguration, said Friday he is cutting off funding to any Republican candidate who doesn't support pending legislation protecting young immigrants who were brought to the country illegally as children.

"I'm not supporting politicians that aren't working hard to get this done, from the dogcatcher on up," MacNeil said by phone from Italy, where he was traveling.

MacNeil, an entrepreneur who built a car floor mat manufacturing empire in south suburban Bolingbrook, donated \$1 million to Trump's January 2017 inauguration. He shares the "made in America" mantra that dominated Trump's campaign, as well as the call for tighter border security.

But Trump's September decision to rescind the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals program has hit home for MacNeil, who has at least two people covered by the program among the 1,600 employees at WeatherTech.

One of them is an 11-year employee and the company's export sales manager. On Thursday night, she accepted the large business exporter of the year award from the Illinois Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity on behalf of WeatherTech,

MacNeil said.

The employee, who came to the Chicago area with her family from Mexico when she was 12 years old, may soon be out of a job, or deported, without DACA protection, MacNeil said.

"She works in the export department, helping sell American-manufactured goods all over the world," he said. "Is this not an important person? Is this not an important job? It just frustrates me to see political deadlock and gamesmanship and playing political football with people's lives."

While MacNeil is a vocal spokesman for his own company — he voices his own radio spots, for example — he is not used to being outspoken on political issues. But he chose to speak up this week as part of a broader effort by the Illinois Business Immigration Coalition, a group of business leaders and associations that formed five years ago to promote immigration reform.

MacNeil is on the coalition's steering committee.

The coalition is looking

to push a discharge petition introduced earlier this month by moderate Republicans that would bypass House leadership and bring four competing DACA-related measures to the floor for consideration.

The petition has gained momentum and is just a few Republican votes shy of succeeding, said Rebecca Shi, executive director of the Illinois Business Immigration Coalition.

"We saw this discharge petition moving... We were just about five Republican votes short of getting this to the floor," Shi said Friday. "We made the decision, our business leaders really wanted to make sure their voices were heard loud and clear."

Enacted by President Barack Obama in 2012 through executive order, DACA provided temporary relief to about 800,000 young immigrants brought to the United States illegally as children, enabling them to work and attend schools without the threat of deportation. It did not provide permanent legal status and needed to be renewed every two years.

While Trump's decision to rescind the program is working its way through the court system, Congress has been unable to move forward on any permanent legislation to replace it.

MacNeil said he supported Trump's decision to rescind the executive order but urged him to get behind a permanent legislative solution.

"This is a law that needs to be enacted by Congress," he said.

Until then, MacNeil and other business leaders are watching which legislators sign on to the petition, and which do not. Fixing the program, MacNeil said, will be a prerequisite to his future financial support of candidates.

If efforts to move immigration legislation forward fail, MacNeil said the forced termination of his workers would be a blow to his company and a personal loss. But MacNeil, a U.S. citizen who emigrated legally from Canada as an infant, said the loss to the country would be devastating.

"America is a country of immigrants, and there are 800,000 people who have grown up here and been educated here — they have their own American dreams to follow," he said. "To think that we would possibly jeopardize losing these people to some other country would be a tragedy of epic proportion."

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## Illinois wants to restrict short-term insurance

Advocacy groups say Trump administration plan could leave consumers in the lurch

Illinois is considering legislation that would impose limits on short-term health insurance plans that the Trump administration is seeking to expand.

Dozens of Illinois advocacy groups, under the umbrella of the Protect Our Care Coalition, are supporting a bill that would impose a six-month limit on the use of short-term insurance plans — coverage originally meant to serve as a stopgap for consumers between health insurance plans, such as people changing jobs who can't afford continued coverage under a previous employer's plan or students taking a semester off school.

Now, consumers are only supposed to use such plans for about three months at a time. But the Trump administration has proposed a rule that would allow people to enroll in the plans for nearly a year at a time.

The administration argues that the plans can help consumers save money as traditional insurance premiums are climbing and choices are dwindling. Consumer advocacy groups, however, say short-term plans can leave consumers in a lurch because they often don't cover things like maternity care, pre-existing conditions, mental health or prescription medications.

In addition to the six-month time limit, the bill would require warnings about what the plans do not cover to be read aloud to consumers buying the plans or featured on websites where they're sold. The state Senate on Friday unanimously passed the bill.

"We really want consumers to understand what they're purchasing, and that while on the very superficial level they may seem very cost-effective, they can end up being more expensive for consumers in the long run," said Ramon Gardenhire, vice president of policy and advocacy at the AIDS Foundation of Chicago, one of the groups backing the bill.

The advocacy groups also worry that expanding the use of short-term plans could drive up premiums for people who buy individual insurance coverage through the Affordable Care Act exchange. They're concerned that young, healthy people will turn away from coverage on the exchange in favor of cheaper short-term plans. That could leave an imbalance

of sicker people, who require more care, on the exchange, further driving up premiums.

This month, the Congressional Budget Office estimated that if Trump's proposals go into effect, about 2 million people would enroll in short-term plans by 2023. It estimated that premiums would rise by about 2 to 3 percent for consumers in small group and individual plans because of that change and others.

The Trump administration says that expanding short-term insurance plans would give consumers additional, much-needed choices.

In 2016, a short-term policy cost about \$124 a month, compared with \$393 for an Obamacare-compliant plan, according to the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services, though the compliant plan price doesn't take into account tax credits. The agency didn't say what level plan was \$393.

"In a market that is experiencing double-digit rate increases, allowing short-term, limited-duration insurance to cover longer periods gives Americans options and could be the difference between someone getting coverage or going without coverage at all," agency Administrator Seema Verma said in a news release.

On average, insurers in Illinois increased rates by 16 to 37 percent for the lowest-priced plans on the exchange this year.

Other states also are considering legislation aimed at curbing the use of short-term plans.

California lawmakers are weighing legislation that would forbid the use of short-term insurance plans entirely. Hawaii lawmakers recently passed a bill imposing limits on the use of such plans, and the governor of Maryland recently signed a bill limiting the plans there to three months.

The original Illinois bill also would have limited short-term plans to three months, but that was extended to six months as a compromise with those who had previously opposed the bill, including insurance industry groups, said Kathy Waligora, director of health reform initiative at EverThrive Illinois, which also is backing the bill.

The Illinois bill also would prohibit consumers from so-called stacking, or buying multiple short-term insurance plans to be used one right after another, Waligora said.

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## Airlines prepare for likely record number of summer passengers

If you plan to fly on vacation this summer, prepare for unprecedented crowds at the airport.

A record 246.1 million passengers are expected to fly during the season, a 3.7 percent increase over a record set last year, according to Airlines for America, a trade group for the nation's biggest airlines.

The Transportation Security Administration also predicts a record number of

air travelers at airport screening lines from Memorial Day weekend through Labor Day. The TSA expects to screen an average of 2.6 million passengers per day this summer, up from an average of 2 million passengers throughout the year.

Both the airlines and the TSA say they are prepared for the surge in air travelers, which the trade group has accurately predicted before.

The TSA said it has increased staffing by more than 600 officers since the

start of the year and expects to add an additional 1,000 officers before the peak of the summer travel season.

The airline trade group says the country's air carriers plan to add 116,000 seats a day to serve the spike in demand — a surge industry experts attribute to a strong economy.

"As the economy grows along with household net worth, passengers are taking advantage of persistently low airfares for their summer travel plans," said John Heimlich, chief econ-

omist for Airlines for America.

The average annual domestic airfare dropped in 2017 for the third straight year to \$348, according to the U.S. Bureau of Transportation Statistics.

It is unclear if fares will continue to fall. The trade group reported that airline expenses, including wages and fuel costs, rose faster than revenue in the first three months of 2018, cutting into profit margins.

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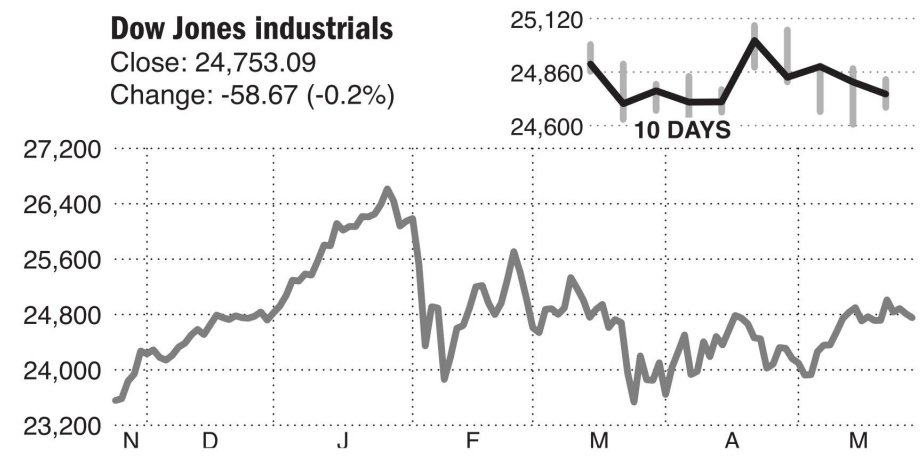

# NFL vs. the patriotism of protest

The National Football League swathes itself in patriotic gestures. We've seen those pregame moments when an unfurled American flag all but covers the field itself. We've watched solemn color guard ceremonies. We've witnessed the roaring fighter jet flyovers. To what extent these displays are heartfelt patriotism or shrewd marketing, we can't be sure.

This week, NFL owners found themselves with the perfect opportunity to encourage patriotism without a hint of jingoism. At issue was the two-year controversy over players who protest police violence against minorities by kneeling during the national anthem.

**The league could have embraced the sometimes difficult-to-accept patriotism of dissent.**

**Patriotism manifests itself** in myriad ways. Among the most genuine: demanding equal treatment for all and calling attention to social injustice — especially when someone pays a stiff price for protesting.

Like other private-sector employers, the league and its teams have the right to enforce workplace rules. Owners are on firm legal ground setting boundaries on the behavior of their employees. But standing up for a player's right to kneel during the anthem would have sent the message that the NFL embraces the sometimes difficult-to-accept patriotism of dissent.

Instead, the league on Wednesday opted for what it calls a compromise. Players who don't want to stand for the anthem can remain in the locker room until the song ends. But if they're on the field during the anthem, they'll have to stand. The league will have the power to fine teams if their

players do not "stand and show respect for" the anthem and flag. Teams, meanwhile, can decide for themselves whether to mete out discipline for players who protest during the anthem.

At least one team, the New York Jets, is backing a player's right to protest. The team's chairman, Christopher Johnson, said no player would be disciplined for protesting the anthem and that he was willing to pay whatever fine the league imposed. It's a stance we hope other

teams will take, including our Monsters of the Midwest.

**On the same day** the NFL announced its policy change on anthem protests, authorities in Milwaukee released a video of city officers using a Taser on Milwaukee Bucks player Sterling Brown after confronting him over a parking violation. In the video of the Jan. 26 arrest, Brown doesn't appear to resist the officers.

Milwaukee's police chief has apologized for his officers' actions. Still, police mistreatment of minorities is what moved former San Francisco 49ers quarterback Colin Kaepernick to kneel during the anthem at a preseason game two years ago. By kneeling, he stood up for his principles — and paid a heavy price. He can't find work in the NFL, though some coaches have said he could be a starter.

Regardless of whether the rest of us agree with him, the league and its owners should permit Kaepernick's kind of patriotism — with or without the fighter jet flyovers.

# At South Works, dreams dashed once again

Mayor Rahm Emanuel has got to feel good about a batch of big, splashy projects in the works. The City Council just endorsed the bid to build the Barack Obama Presidential Center in Jackson Park. Plans for the massive makeover of the North Branch Industrial Corridor in Lincoln Park are taking shape. And in the South Loop, a project to turn a 62-acre former railyard along the Chicago River into a sprawling community of residential, office, hotel and retail space is gaining steam.

But on the Far South Side, there was a project that had just as much potential to transform a chunk of the city — and in a place where sweeping change is desperately needed. On Thursday, the city learned this is one project Emanuel will have to file under "epic fail."

Ireland-based Emerald Living announced it has abandoned plans to build 20,000 homes on the south lakefront, on the South Works site of the former U.S. Steel complex. The Tribune's Ryan Ori reported that the company, in a news re-

lease, said, "it is very regrettable we were unable to reach common ground with U.S. Steel based on the findings of our diligence works." In April, Spanish developer Barcelona Housing Systems, which had been teaming up with Emerald Living on the South Works project, told the Tribune that plans to purchase and redevelop the land were on hold because of soil contamination issues at the site.

This isn't the first time residents of the Far South Side have had their dreams of a South Works rebirth dashed. There was the \$4 billion plan between U.S. Steel and Chicago-based McCaffery Interests to build 13,000 homes and a 1,500-slip marina. And a decade ago, Solo Cup envisioned the construction of a new factory at South Works. Both ideas went nowhere.

Places like the South Works site that have been languishing for years should be a top-shelf priority for Emanuel. We said before that he ought to roll up his sleeves and make the redevelopment of the site happen. Mr. Mayor, we're still waiting.

### WHAT OTHERS ARE SAYING

Efforts to explain the party's plan to "revisit" the tax law if elected to the House majority underscore the difficult question Democrats are trying to answer: How do you talk about the economy when the economy is good? "Every time (Democrats) deny the economy is starting to turn or get better for certain parts of the population, they also hurt themselves," says party strategist Hank Sheinkopf. "They appear to be cheering on bad news."

And Democrats could face a similar challenge on President Trump's plans to meet North Korean leader Kim Jong Un, an entirely separate issue but nevertheless one that relates to overall feelings of security. While success on that front is hypothetical at this point, opponents of the president are already trying to balance skepticism and applauding signs of progress. A CNN poll found that 77 percent of Americans approve of the meeting. ... And 57 percent of voters said things overall are going well, up from 49 percent registered in the last poll on that question in February.

Notably, 84 percent cited the economy as either extremely or very important factor in how they will vote in November, up from 74 percent in February. And the survey found the Democrats' advantage on the generic ballot to be just 3 percentage points, down from 6 in March and 16 in February.

According to a Quinnipiac University poll taken in April, 52 percent of American voters oppose impeachment. Another poll from around the same time reported that 47 per cent would definitely vote against a candidate who wanted to remove Trump from office. (In a sign of how divided the country is, 42 per cent would definitely vote for a candidate who made such a promise.)

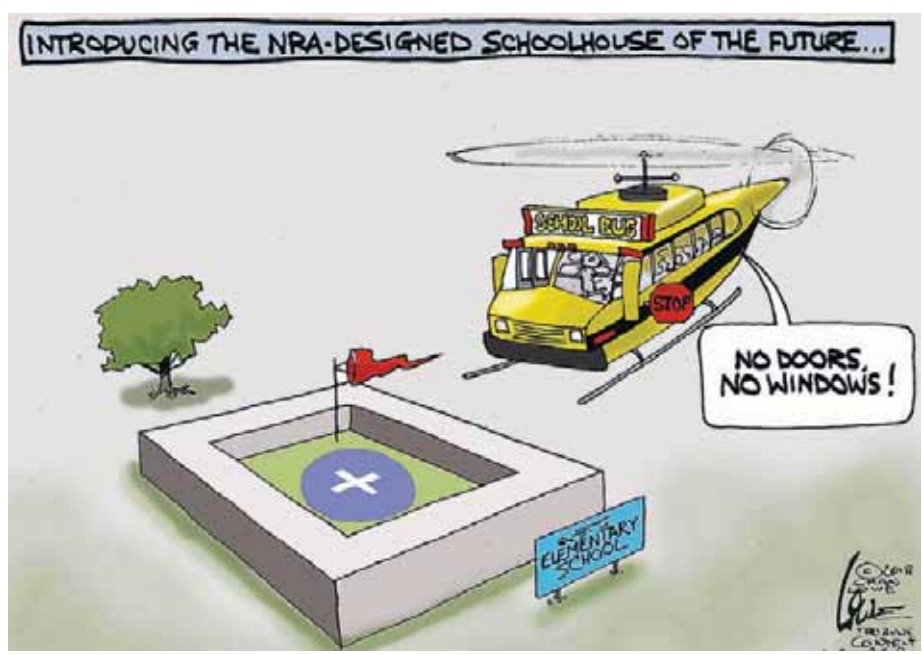
Still, a powerful grassroots movement has formed in support of impeachment, a political cousin of sorts to the recent pushes for women's rights and gun control. According to Quinnipiac, 71 per cent of Democrats already favor impeachment.

In primaries for the 2018 elections, some prominent Democrats, such as Gavin Newsom, the lieutenant governor of California, who is running for governor, made support for impeachment a major part of their platforms. Tom Steyer, a San Francisco billionaire, has since last year been running television advertisements supporting impeachment, and has generated a mailing list of more than 5.2 million people. ...

But their passion, and the mounting evidence against the President, raises the question of whether the drive for impeachment is more likely to result in Trump's removal from office or in a Democratic civil war.

### Strict scrutiny

Many years ago, my husband and I applied for a liquor license, as we were opening a convenience store and were going to sell beer and wine. I had to go to the local police department to be fingerprinted and had a mug shot taken. I paid \$300 to have a background check run on me.

When I was cleared to hold the liquor license, I was then sent to classes run by the police department to learn how to read an ID and spot a potentially fake one. I had to learn Illinois law and the local township/village laws as well. Then I had to prove that I attended these certification classes at the police department to the local township board where we would be opening our business. We went before the board to prove who we were and to answer any questions the members might have. All at our own expense, of course.

I see nothing wrong with this kind of fact-checking to hold a gun license as I had with a liquor license. We could no sooner sell our license or give it away for fear of the government officials bringing their full weight down upon us and taking away our very livelihoods. Too much scrutiny.

My liquor license was issued by the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives. So, I ask, why can't this same agency do both?

### Taking action

It's not a question of if, but when, the next mass shooting will occur as our government refuses to take meaningful action.

Let's start with some important stats (which I'm not saying are 100 percent accurate as different studies show different numbers, so I chose to share more conservative figures).

There are roughly 326 million Americans and almost enough guns owned to arm every man, woman and child in the U.S. Over 100,000 Americans are shot each year (over 7,000 children) and over 30,000 of them die (over 1,000 children). It's estimated that millions of guns are purchased without any background check. Roughly 10 million Americans have a severe mental illness. Almost half of gun owners with children have at least one gun that is unlocked.

What's the solution? Disallow gun ownership — but that's not even a remotely realistic possibility. What should be realistic that can make a meaningful impact: Increase the age of gun ownership (you only need to be 18 to own a gun and in most states there is no age requirement to own a rifle or shotgun, yet you have to be 21 to buy alcohol); require background checks on all gun purchases (when conducted, they have stopped millions of people over the years from being allowed to own firearms); expand the background check database to include more mental health information; don't allow the purchase of semi-automatic weapons like the AR-15 (used in multiple mass shootings); have severe punishments (like a 10-year minimum sentence) for the use of firearms in the commission of a crime as well as severe punishments for irresponsible gun owners (like the parents of teens who kill others using their parents' unlocked guns); require training in safe gun use before buyers are able to purchase firearms; educate parents, teachers, students and others on how to proactively identify people with behaviors that are likely to lead to violent actions and provide a confidential way of reporting such people.

In the meantime, it's sad we need to do this, but all schools need trained and armed guards, limited access points, metal detectors and active shooter training.

### Safe passage

The National Rifle Association's opposition makes it unlikely that we will see meaningful gun control in the near future. A better approach is to have schools limit their entrances and have everyone be screened by a metal detector.

The arguments I've heard about this center around the equipment cost and the expense of hiring someone to monitor the metal detectors. Some quick online research shows walk-through metal detectors ranging in cost from \$1,100 to \$4,200. If the schools can't afford these, I think parents would certainly be willing to chip in to help protect their kids.

Instead of hiring someone to monitor the metal detectors, I suggest having a gym

teacher take that responsibility for the first hour or so each morning. Most gym teachers are probably in good physical shape, and would recognize many of the students. A half-hour or so after start time, doors would be locked, and gym teachers could go back to their regular gym classes.

Granted, there would be a lot of logistics for schools to work out, including extra compensation for the gym teachers. But is this approach worth pursuing?

## Masterful, funny, truly Irish

Druid Theatre offers an enlightened take on Beckett's tramps

During my pre-show detour in the interests of personal comfort, an announcement of a pending curtain came across the Chicago Shakespeare Theater loudspeaker, which reaches *everywhere*. Beginning shortly, remarked the canned Irish voice, would be tonight's performance of "Waiting for Godot."

I looked up. She said "GOD-oh," the common pronunciation of the play in Samuel Beckett's native Ireland, as distinct from the more common (and Francophile) "god-OH" usually heard on this side of the Atlantic. My mood lifted. "God-OH," in all its linguistic pretension, really sums up what can go wrong with this play when it's treated as a weighty work of absurdism, a *classique* of the last century performed with actorly earnestness and directorial pretension. But the perky, chippy, ironic "GOD-oh," not that far removed from the Australian "G'day" but Irish nonetheless, is emblematic of all that's right about this masterful touring Druid Theatre Company production, as directed by its veteran co-founder Garry Hynes.

Which is to say the show is fun. As entertaining as any "Godot" I've seen (and this ain't my first rodeo with the tramps). A blast. Actual belly laughs. And I'm not talking invasive vaudevilian clowning, which has its place in the world but is a curse in this play, but deeper amusements based in human truth.

"Godot" must be entertaining for two reasons.

One is that the entire evening is devoted to the incomparable explication that no one — or, if you prefer, nothing — is coming to save us as we crawl from birth to death, so that if you are not actually enjoying yourself as you wait for the moment when your heart stops, then what, dear reader, is the point of your brief stay on this planet?

The other is that, when faced with the above, a sense of humor thus metastasizes into active rebellion. Indeed, along with love for one's fellow traveler, having a good time is about the only reasonable response that thousands of years of human philosophizing has put in our personal quivers.

Beckett knew this, of course,

and so he wrote a fun play that knew it was a play — the two central characters, Vladimir (Marty Rea) and Estragon (Aaron Monaghan) are constantly poking fun at their audience, assuming their personas, making their judgments and even wryly observing, "it's like we're talking in a vacuum." As are we all, boys.

Rea and Monaghan are famous stage actors in Ireland, and so is Rory Nolan, who powers his way through a rather terrifying Pozzo,

one of the visitors to the spot where the tramps wait, alongside Lucky (Garrett Lombard), who is anything but. This is a quartet of masterful performances — close to textually perfect, as far as I could tell, and you can't mess around with Beckett, whose estate rightly frowns on any deviations from the abnormal.

Hynes' casting plays up the physical contrasts, as great comic duos have done for years. Rea is tall, in possession of a rising tenor and a quizzical, techie demeanor, kind of a Cupertino Vladimir you might say. Monaghan is shorter, barkier, more intense.

His guy has to deal with no access to Facebook, where someone might say, "You got this, Estragon." All he has is Vladimir, and you feel his need. And, at the same time, you're envious.

At one point though, Monaghan stretches his body into the same

kind of diagonal line that Michael Jackson famously pulled off in "Smooth Criminal," well, not quite that far out, but close. It is a reminder that contrasts always work best in the theater when the director is willing to subvert them, and, of course, of the physical mastery over their bodies that these actors enjoy.

Francis O'Connor's set keeps you going for a while. She has to have the tree, of course, but she also has the aura of a museum exhibition, or an operating theater or a sense memory or whatever, really, you want to feel as you watch its border of white light blazing as nobody comes, nobody goes and life goes on and on and on.

Have a laugh this weekend.

## Chico Freeman fired up in homecoming

Saxophonist's volleys of sound punctuate propulsive rhythm

"It's good to be back home," saxophonist Chico Freeman told the audience Thursday night at the Jazz Showcase, and he obviously meant it.

For once the former Chicagoan picked up his horn, he produced not only an avalanche of notes but a warm, deep tone worthy of a homecoming.

The son of the late Chicago saxophone master Von Freeman and nephew of 91-year-old Chicago guitarist George Freeman, Chico Freeman brings to the stage a familial legacy inextricably bound up with this city. So even though the saxophonist long was based in Europe and in recent years moved to New York, he always speaks expansively of his Chicago roots, as he did on this occasion.

Between songs, Freeman reminisced on hearing life-altering sessions at earlier outposts of the Jazz Showcase and being transformed by many of them, particularly the galvanic pianism of McCoy Tyner and, of course, the tenor saxophone soliloquies of his father. Combine those two influences — a larger-than-life pianist and a ceaselessly experimental

saxophonist — and you have a sense of the volcanic music-making Freeman offered on this night.

He opened full force with his hard-charging "Black Inside," from his "Spoken Into Existence" album, Freeman's big and brawny solos bolstered by similarly epic accompaniment from pianist Theo Hill, bassist Junius Paul and drummer Ernie Adams. This was full-throated, hold-nothing-back improvisation, Freeman producing great volleys of sound while riding propulsive rhythmic energy from the rest of the band.

After this heroic opener, Freeman clearly needed to turn down the dial. He did so in the most introspective piece of the set, his idiosyncratically titled "Enchance," conceived in homage to Tyner. Its dark tone and incantatory phrasemaking may not have evoked Tyner's cyclonic approach to the piano, but it surely expressed Freeman's profound reverence for the man and his music. Not surprisingly, pianist Hill stepped to the forefront here, offering his own Tyner homage in the form of copious melodic invention and constantly driving

rhythm (though Hill erred by plunking a final chord after Freeman had closed his last solo).

Anyone familiar with the Freeman family knows that humor is inseparable from their lives on-stage and off, a point the saxophonist underscored in his "Playpen." Its puckish spirit, piquant dissonance and herky-jerky rhythms brought forth the whimsical side of Freeman's art, a sharp contrast to everything that had come before.

And if anyone doubted Freeman's conversance with the bebop language of his father, they need only have listened to Freeman's account of the standard "There Is No Greater Love." From the outset, Freeman crafted ornate lines and fast-flying figurations, though inside a smooth-as-silk timbre befitting the tune. When it came time to recap the theme, Freeman pushed still more deeply into Charlie Parker territory, offering

classic bebop of the sort his father championed.

Freeman put an exclamation point on all of this with Tyner's "Passion Dance," a staple of Freeman's repertoire and a heroically scaled finale for the set. So what seemed like full-throttle opening passages gave way to a series of ever-swelling climaxes, one sonic burst leading to yet another.

Freeman tested his colleagues at one point, stepping away from the microphone for quite a while and leaving them with the responsibility of keeping the momentum going. Thanks to Hill's relentlessly percussive pianism, bassist Paul's sharply articulated attacks and Adams' unstoppable thunder on drums, the stage was set for Freeman's cathartic summation.

## Salonen delivers intense 'Transfigured Night'

Esa-Pekka Salonen has built a firm reputation as a probing interpreter of even the knottiest of contemporary scores. Yet the clarifying intelligence and composer's insights into how music is made that the Finnish conductor and composer brings to earlier orchestral repertoire must never be taken lightly.

Salonen reminded us of that fact with his searching account of Mahler's Ninth Symphony at last week's Chicago Symphony Orchestra subscription concert. And he is doing so again with the Brahms-Bartok-Schoenberg program that concludes his two-week spring residency at Symphony Center this weekend.

Though coming at the end of a killer week, Thursday night's CSO event brought no obvious slackening of energy on the part of Salonen or the orchestra players. The clearheaded focus on musical essentials that marked his Mahler as well as the rigorously demanding MusicNOW series season finale he guest conducted on Monday was much in evidence.

The pairing of Brahms' "Variations on a Theme by Haydn" at the beginning of the program and Arnold Schoenberg's "Transfigured Night" at the end made perfect sense: Schoenberg's most popular work is an extension of the German Romantic tonal harmonic language of Brahms and Wagner. Originally a string sextet, "Verklarte Nacht" (1899) was later expanded for full string orchestra, and it is this version, in its 1943 revision, the CSO is presenting at these concerts.

Seldom does the full Chicago Symphony string

choir get the Armour Stage all to itself, and this remarkable instrumental body savored its half-hour in the limelight, playing beautifully for Salonen, making "Transfigured Night" the highlight of the concert.

Forget the Salonen stereotype as a somewhat cool exponent of orchestral late Romanticism. His Schoenberg was brains and heart in perfect balance, at once hotblooded and finely controlled. Salonen brought out the unabashed eroticism and sensuality of the Richard Dehmel poem that inspired Schoenberg's tone poem. He shaped the heaving surges of string sound with a close regard for quality and quantity of tone color. The restless lyrical ebb and flow climbed to magnificent peaks of intensity, falling back to take deep breaths before gathering renewed strength.

If "Transfigured Night" is Schoenberg before he strode boldly into modernity, the Third Piano Concerto (1945) finds the seriously ill Bela Bartok backing off from the angular, dissonant modernity of his middle-period style.

The charismatic pianist Mitsuko Uchida was playing the concerto for the third time with the CSO, having done so under Daniel Barenboim in 2005 and Pierre Boulez in 2008.

I found her latest Bartok Third rather less successful than previous performances, although anything this remarkable artist performs is deeply musical. Her Bartok was informed by her usual rhythmic acuity, a true poetic sensibility and a firm tone that held its own against Salonen's attentive accompaniment. Even with a glaring slip of the fingers in the opening pages, the evocative slow movement came off the best — a true "Adagio religioso" — Uchida merging her supple lyrical lines with the chirpy woodwinds in the "night music" interlude before she tore into the propulsive finale.

The pianist was called back to the stage repeatedly and bowed deep to the audience each time. The crowd (an unusually cough-happy throng) clearly expected an encore, but a smiling Uchida declined with a wave.

Salonen gave the orchestra its due prominence in the musical dialogues so essential to this score. I, for one, can't wait to hear what he does with another Bartok masterpiece, the opera "Bluebeard's Castle," here next season.

His reading of the Brahms Haydn Variations allowed each variation its due contrast and character, although I missed the classical structural integrity Bernard Haitink brought to his CSO account nearly two decades ago. The warmly sonorous strings and firmly cohesive brasses gave it their all Thursday.

I know it sounds judgmental, but I find her lack of reciprocity, her insensitivity and her self-centered and self-obsessed attitude appalling. I am embarrassed by her behavior.

How do I find peace of mind and accept her for the person she has chosen to be?

**Dear Upset:** First comes acceptance, and then comes peace of mind.

As challenging as a purpose-driven life can be to actually live, a life of direction, generosity, reciprocity and meaningful relationships is rewarding. One of my favorite quotes (from Ralph Waldo Emerson) relates to this: "The purpose of life is not to be happy. It is to be useful, to be honorable, to be compassionate, to have it make some difference

that you have lived, and lived well."

You may be living this life; your daughter is not. All the same, you did raise her. Why didn't you teach her differently?

Her lifestyle will not prepare her for dealing with loss, loneliness, illness or the abundant joy of earning achievements. Her grandfather's spoiling wealth might have set her up for this, but just as adults can rise above childhood deprivation, so too can they recover from a nasty case of affluenza. You mention that she is adopted. If you think she is struggling with issues related to identity or abandonment, you should offer to help her explore these questions. Otherwise, because she renounces holidays, consider yourself off the hook to send gifts but keep in touch, especially on her birthday and adoption day, to remind her that she is loved.

And yes, you should love her, even if you don't like her. Loving without expectation, through disappointment, will liberate you from your harsh judgment and should lead to acceptance. Don't give up on her.

**Dear Amy:** I've lived in my house for 12 years. It's in a quiet neighborhood of retired and working-class people, and everybody tends to mind their own business and stay in their own yards.

Recently, a new family with kids moved in across the street. From day one, they've been disruptive. They roam around, lie in the middle of the street and use my yard as an extension of their own for their games. They're con-

stantly chasing their balls into my yard.

I'm not confrontational, but I don't want this to continue. I've considered putting out some "Stay off the grass" signs or making an anonymous complaint with the police, but I don't want to overreact either. Do you have advice?

**Dear Ball Catcher:** Calling the police because kids are playing is an extreme overreaction. The best and most neighborly approach would be to walk across the street, introduce yourself to these children and their parents, and ask them not to play on your lawn.

Ask the parents if they would be willing to exchange phone numbers, in case there is a problem. Obviously, chasing a ball into (or lying) in the street is extremely unsafe.

Children don't recognize boundaries the way adults do, so you'll have to teach them that they should confine their play to their own lawn.

Thank you for suggesting Al-Anon as a first stop for her! Attending Al-Anon meetings basically saved my life 12 years ago.

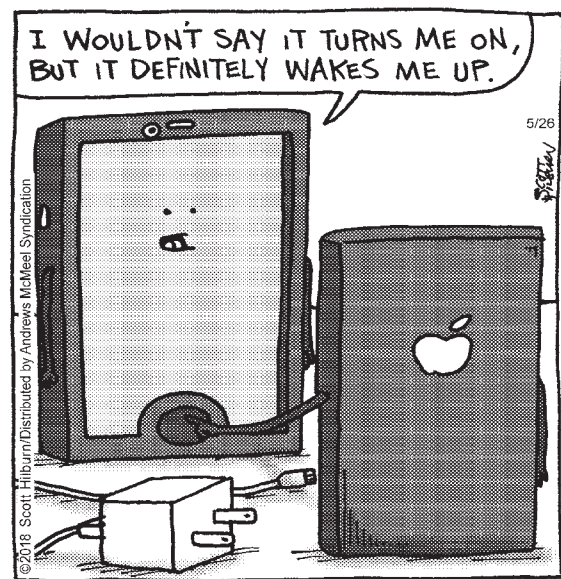

On this unlucky lie of the cards, that line of play promoted a trump winner for West and South went down one. Can you do better?

Of course you can! Discard a spade on the queen of clubs at trick two. Ruff a spade, cross back to dummy with the ace of hearts, and ruff another spade. Draw the trumps and claim. What's the problem?

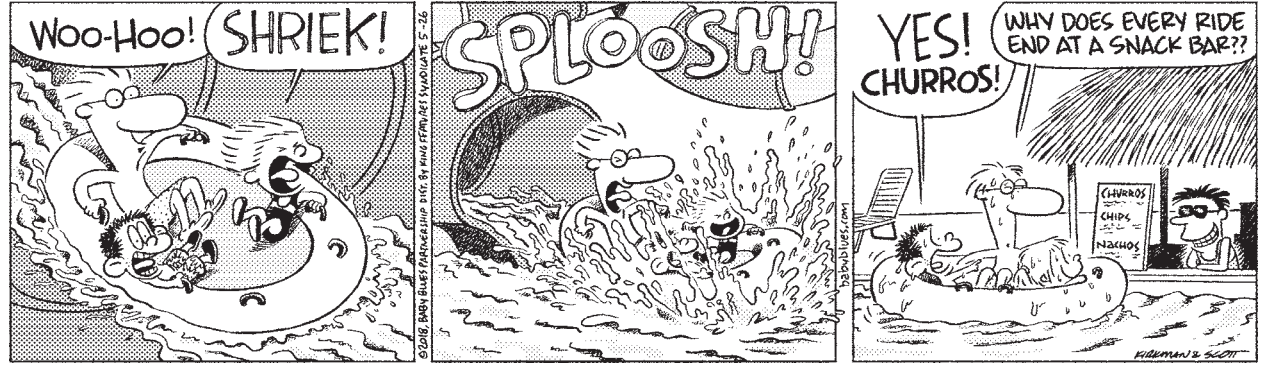

## Lopez's outing goes for naught

Sox starter allows 5 hits in 7 innings, but pen can't seal deal

DETROIT — Well, that unraveled quickly.

The White Sox looked as if they might dominate early Friday night. Yoan Moncada's leadoff double and two runs in the first inning signaled Sox hitters were dialed into Tigers starter Mike Fiers, while Reynaldo Lopez didn't allow a hit to the Tigers until the fourth inning.

But it all fell apart in the eighth when the Tigers rallied for three runs and went on to win 5-4 at Comerica Park.

The Sox were nursing a two-run lead when Bruce Rondon relieved Lopez, and the Tigers feasted. Jose Iglesias doubled to lead off the inning and Leonys Martin's liner drove him in to make it 4-3. Then Nicholas Castellanos doubled to left, and Martin tucked his arm in to dodge Sox catcher Omar Narvaez's tag to tie the game.

The final ignominy was Sox first baseman Jose Abreu twisting around with his back to the ball as he tried unsuccessfully to track down Jeimer Candelario's short fly. It dropped alongside Abreu to score Castellanos and give the Tigers the lead.

"I don't know if either one of them had a bead," manager Rick Renteria said. "(Abreu) is usually really, really good on those fly balls, even ones that go behind him like that one."

Still, it wasn't all bad news.

"Games like this when you are ahead and then, for whatever reason, you don't get the win ... it's tough," Lopez said. "Like everybody said, we can't stick with this. Today's game is over and we need to think

# Patience will pay

Epstein nixes rumors, says team has 'more than enough' to win

For all the angst over the Cubs' up-and-down season, there really aren't too many spots in glaring need of change.

Before Friday's 6-2 victory over the Giants at Wrigley Field, they were second in the National League in runs scored, fourth in hitting and third in pitching. The bullpen has been much improved, and the bench is deep.

That might be why Cubs President Theo Epstein declared Friday the "noise" from the media on a potential trade was not based in reality, and the team just needs to fix its inconsistencies from within.

That's basically the same mantra of Cubs players, who

know the kind of talent they have inside the clubhouse.

The theory the Cubs will heat up with the weather will be tested now. Friday was the first sweltering day at home, and Zobrist's two-run double in the four-run seventh launched them to the victory.

While acknowledging the frustration of fans seeking instant gratification, Cubs President Theo Epstein expresses patience and faith in his players that he believes they will evolve into a consistent winner.

"Look at the track record of this group," Epstein said. "We're going through the same process as we (always) do. It's just taking more frustrating twists and turns than we hoped. It's natural."

The Cubs' performance Friday mirrored the script Epstein discussed as they broke through for four runs with clutch execution to pull away to a 6-2 victory over the Giants at warm Wrigley Field.

## James scores 46 to force Game 7

LeBron, Hill help Cavs avoid elimination after Love leaves with injury

CLEVELAND — LeBron James chose Boston as the place he'll play next. Game 7 is on. And any talk about James' future is on hold.

James scored 46 points and preserved his reign atop the Eastern Conference for at least one more game as the Cavaliers shook off losing All-Star Kevin Love with a head injury and beat the Celtics 109-99 on Friday night to force a decisive climax to this back-and-forth series.

James, playing in perhaps his final game for the Cavs in Cleveland, delivered another sensational performance — he added 11 rebounds and nine assists while playing all but two minutes — to avoid elimination and delay any decisions about where he'll continue his remarkable career next season.

"Greatness," Cavs coach Tyrone Lue said. "Gave it his all. We needed that, especially with Kevin going down. He delivered. He

carried us home as usual."

The king is not dead, and he still has a chance to make his eighth straight NBA Finals.

"It feels good just to be able to play for another game," James said. "Like I've always said, Game 7 is the best two words in sports. We should relish the opportunity and have fun with it."

This series, in which home court has meant everything, will have a fitting conclusion Sunday at TD Center, where the Celtics are 10-0 this postseason.

## Brown offers his side of the story

Bucks player felt police officers' actions 'unnecessary'

Bucks guard Sterling Brown appeared on ABC's "Good Morning America" on Friday to discuss his January encounter with the Milwaukee police.

The Milwaukee Police Department on Wednesday released footage that showed Brown being arrested and police using a Taser on him on Jan. 26.

He had been cited for parking his car across multiple handicapped spaces.

When the incident occurred, Brown — who grew up in Maywood and went to Proviso East — took only a handful of questions from reporters, saying it was a "personal issue."

After the release of the video, which was captured by a police body camera, he released a statement on Twitter.

His interview with Robin Roberts that aired Friday was the first time he has spoken about the incident publicly.

"He told me to back up, he told me to get away from the car and all that," Brown told Roberts in the five-minute television segment. "I asked him, 'What's going on? What are you doing?' I'm double parked, but he called backup and backup came. From there, they surrounded me."

When asked about the several police cars that later arrived, Brown said: "I felt like it was unnecessary. The officer ... said he only wanted one squad car, but they all came. From there, I just stayed calm and tried to get out of the situation."

Brown told Roberts the video is upsetting for him to watch because he was "defenseless." Brown said he was on the ground for 10 minutes after police used a Taser to subdue him.

"Whether I was parking legally or not, it shouldn't have led to what it led to," Brown said in the interview.

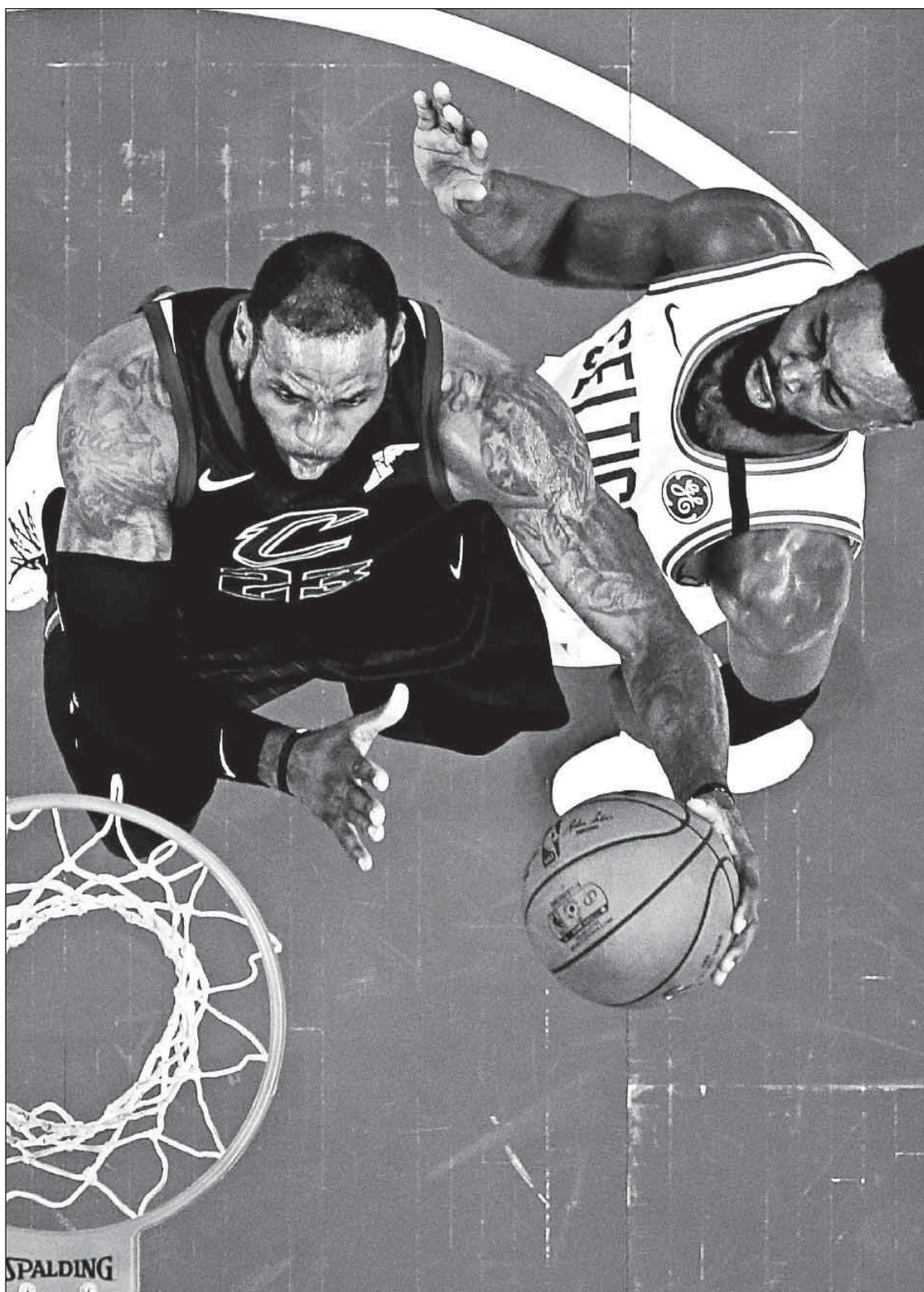
Brown is pursuing legal action against the Milwaukee Police Department. He told Roberts he hopes the lawsuit he filed will "hold officers accountable."

Milwaukee Police Chief Alfonso Morales condemned the officers' actions in a statement as the footage was released.

"When I took office, I vowed to rebuild trust between the Milwaukee Police Department and the community," the statement said in part. "We are doing that."

According to the Milwaukee Journal Sentinel, the officer who first confronted Brown in the Walgreens parking lot was suspended two days. Two other officers were suspended 10 and 15 days. The officers' names have not been released.

Epstein took pains before the game to shoot down the Manny Machado-to-the-Cubs rumor that took off like wildfire this week when Machado came to town with the Orioles to play the White Sox.

Though he wouldn't specifically address Machado, Epstein said: "A simple way to put it is there has been a lot of trade rumors involving the Cubs, and there is essentially zero trade talks right now involving the Cubs, so there's a real disparity between the noise and the reality, and sometimes that puts a player or two that we have in a real tough circumstance."

"It's my job to clarify there is nothing going on right now. We have more than enough ability to win the division, to win the World Series. We really have to focus on our roster and getting the most out of our ability and finding some consistency. A constant focus outside the organization doesn't do us any good, especially when it's not based in reality."

Epstein said the Cubs are trying to find out "who we are" before deciding on whether to make any big moves.

"Everybody is talking about making trades in May," he said. "The first part of the season is finding out who you are."

By that Epstein meant finding out the team's strengths, weaknesses, character and chemistry, along with the short-term and long-term goals. We're two months in, but the trade deadline is still two months away.

"If you rush to those kinds of judgments, you often can make things worse," he said. "It's important to figure out exactly who you are and give guys a chance to find their level and see how all the pieces fit together before you make your adjustments."

Despite lackluster starts to the season from Yu Darvish, Jose Quintana and Tyler Chatwood, the Cubs have gotten a lot out of Jon Lester and Kyle Hendricks, who allowed one run in seven innings Friday to improve to 4-3 with a 3.16 ERA.

Manager Joe Maddon said Hendricks is throwing as well as he has seen him.

"He showed emotion, that one game (in Cincinnati)," Maddon said. "He came out of it a little bit. I couldn't believe it. He actually became human for a second, and I talked to him about it. I'd never seen that before. He's a metronome, in a good way. For me, he's on top of his game right now."

Darvish and Quintana have great track records, so the one spot in the rotation that could be in jeopardy in the second half is Chatwood's. In nine starts he has allowed an astonishing 40 walks in 45 2/3 innings, the highest total among major-league pitchers, and his walks per 9 innings (7.88) is well above the second-worst in that category, Padres starter Bryan Mitchell's 6.86.

But Maddon points to Chatwood's stingy opponents batting average of .217 and suggests he will get his act together soon. His walks per 9 innings over his career is 4.4. Asked if Chatwood was assured of a spot in the rotation the rest of the year, Maddon said he hasn't thought about it.

"I see him as fixing it," Maddon said. "I'm not trying to be (a) Pollyanna. I like his stuff that much."

So the Cubs will stick with what they have for the immediate future, and maybe make adjustments down the road, perhaps in July when trades usually are made.

"That's the natural order of things," Epstein said. "I mean, we wouldn't be opposed to doing something earlier, but that's not the case right now. That's not happening."

## Liverpool's Salah challenges Ronaldo's supremacy

KIEV, Ukraine — For once in a Champions League final, Cristiano Ronaldo will yield some of the spotlight to another player sweeping up adulation and personal acclaim.

While five-time world player of the year Ronaldo is chasing a record fifth Champions League triumph and fourth with Real Madrid, Liverpool forward Mohamed Salah is chasing a first. Not just a first Champions League success, but a first major title in his maiden cup final.

Victory in Kiev's Olympic Stadium on Saturday would be a fitting climax to an astonishing debut season at Liverpool for Salah, a season in which the Egyptian seized his second chance at a Premier League club with gusto after a faltering spell with Chelsea.

Salah has had such a devastating

impact that he poses a serious threat to the decade of dominance of the world player of the year award by Ronaldo and Barcelona's Lionel Messi.

"Comparing players with Ronaldo and Messi is something you can't do," Real Madrid captain Sergio Ramos said Friday. "They're in another orbit. There are players who are in fashion, those who come and go and others who stay around."

"Salah is a top player, that's clear. He has shown that this year and he's got a great chance to show that over the next few years as Ronaldo and Messi have done — but the day after tomorrow."

While lacking the flashy touch of Ronaldo and presenting the image of a more modest lifestyle on social media, the "Egyptian King" is as adept at harnessing his commercial appeal. In recent weeks, Salah could be found at

news conferences promoting a cellphone company, a logistics firm and taxi service. No wonder he is making the most of his newly elevated status in the global game.

In 2014, when Ronaldo reached the first of his four Champions League finals with Madrid, Salah was just completing his first five months drifting in and out of the Chelsea team.

Salah never settled and was discarded by the west London club after only 13 appearances under Jose Mourinho. His career was reignited with Roma, and Liverpool came calling last year.

Few could have imagined Salah's impact, powering the five-time European champions to their first Champions League final in 11 years with 11 goals in a run that began in the playoff round. Ronaldo eclipsed Salah in the competition with 15 goals after starting in

the group stage.

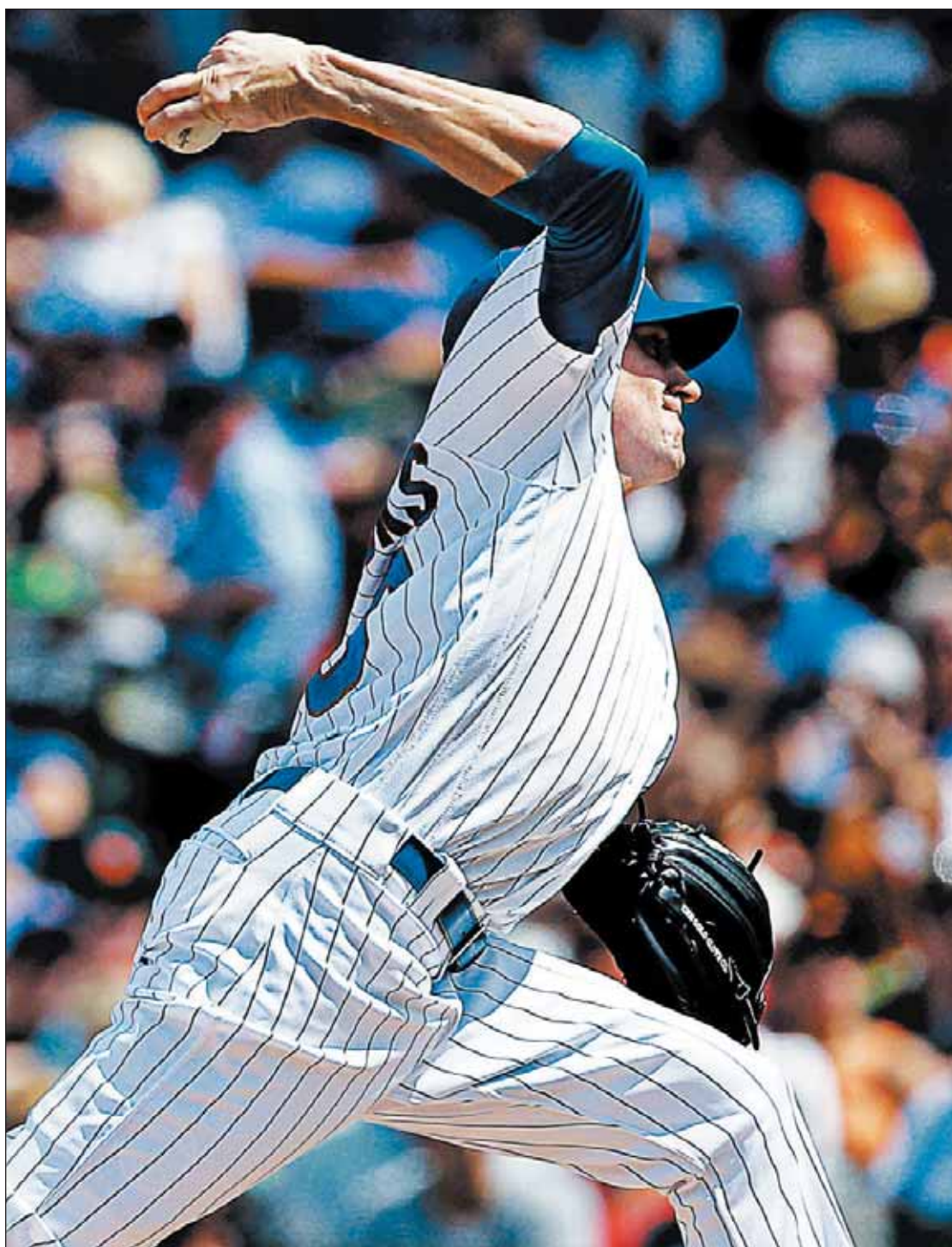
But Salah and Ronaldo stand locked on 44 goals for the season in all competitions heading into the final. So potent is the 33-year-old Ronaldo, he required only 43 games. Salah, who is eight years younger, played eight more than the Portuguese.

"He's the best," Madrid coach Zinedine Zidane said of Ronaldo, "and he proves it every year."

Particularly in Europe, where Ronaldo is the all-time-leading Champions League scorer with 120 goals. Real Madrid is seeking a record-extending 13th European club title.

"When you're at this club you cannot take your foot off the gas, least of all in this competition," Ronaldo said. "I love that side of it because it motivates me a lot."

Ben Zobrist hopes to get some clarity regarding a potential uniform rule change allowing him to wear black cleats when the Cubs are in New York next week.

"It's not resolved completely yet, but in the meantime, we have a little bit of freedom until we have something in place," said Zobrist, who plans to meet with officials from the Major League Baseball Players Association.

Zobrist said officials from MLB and the players union met Monday to discuss relaxing the rule, which stipulates the color of a player's shoes must be at least 51 percent of his team's dominant color.

Zobrist is at the center of the dispute after posting on his Instagram account that he re-

ceived letters from MLB warning him he could be subject to penalties if he kept wearing his black shoes instead of a model in the Cubs' standard blue.

One big issue is how much individual teams are willing to relax the rules.

"It's a rule they have to enforce league-wide," Zobrist said. "That's why there were warnings."

"They have to get a consensus from teams. And players have to get a consensus. And if we can come to an agreement to restructure it a little bit that gives us the freedom within our team to do what we want to do, then hopefully we'll be able to wear black shoes."

**Late fishing:** President Theo Epstein is tempering expectations over the Cubs having five of

the first 98 picks in the June 4-6 amateur draft.

"We have two extra picks, but it's not like it used to be," Epstein said.

In 2006, Epstein supervised the Red Sox draft that selected five of the first 47 picks, with all five players — Jacoby Ellsbury, Craig Hansen, Clay Buchholz, Jed Lowrie and Michael Bowden — reaching the majors.

The insertion of competitive-balance selections after the second round and moving the compensation picks to after the first means the Cubs won't make their third and fourth choices until the 77th and 78th picks.

"We have a chance to have a really good draft, and our guys are really prepared," Epstein said. "So I look forward to infusing the system with more talent."

# Rodon seems fine after liner to head

DETROIT — A line drive to the forehead likely won't be a setback for White Sox pitcher Carlos Rodon as he continues working his way back from offseason shoulder surgery, manager Rick Renteria said.

"It didn't look pretty; (it was a) pretty good blow," Renteria said Friday about Rodon's injury, which occurred during his start for Triple A-Charlotte on Thursday.

"He has a few staples there (from the laceration), but right now he's feeling good enough to make his next start. I don't believe it will affect his path back."

Renteria expects Rodon to make at least two more rehab starts before finally joining the Sox, though that is not yet a certainty.

According to a team statement, Rodon showed no concussion symptoms after being examined by doctors.

After being hit, Rodon seemed eager to stay in the game. He left his second rehab start after giving up one hit while striking out six in 2<sup>2</sup>/<sub>3</sub> scoreless innings. Of his 40 pitches, 29 were strikes.

Reliever Chris Volstad said video replays of Rodon being hit looked "definitely scary."

"(But) you could tell he was aware and awake," Volstad said. "He was feeling his head, and the reports are that he's good to go. (We're) definitely thankful for that."

"He's a strong dude obviously. He's hardheaded, I guess."

**Emotional return:** Charlie Tilson batted eighth in the lineup Friday and admitted returning to Comerica Park brought up old feelings.

On Aug. 2, 2016, he tore his left hamstring in his major-league debut while trying to field a fly ball. He then missed the next season with a stress reaction in his right foot and stress fracture in his right ankle.

Tilson fled out and bunted into a fielder's choice in his first two at-bats Friday, then hit an infield single in the sixth.

"There's a little bit of emotion involved, especially walking back last night to the hotel," said Tilson, who on Thursday played in his first major-league game since then, going 0-for-3 against the Orioles.

"I was a little bit angry," Lopez said. "But I was trying to remind myself what our pitching coach (Don Cooper) tells us every time: 'Just keep your focus, execute your pitches and keep control of the game.'"

Lopez threw 96 pitches in his seven innings, giving up two runs on five hits.

"Lopez threw the ball great again," Renteria said. "(It was a) tremendous outing, but he was out of gas after the seventh. He was dead."

# Fan favorite fast as big day nears

Former winner Kanaan posts best lap of Friday's practice

INDIANAPOLIS — A massive tattoo adorning most of Tony Kanaan's right arm depicts highlights of the driver's life, including his Indianapolis 500 victory in 2013.

Kanaan hopes there's more ink in his future.

The Brazilian is attempting to win his second Indy 500 on Sunday at 43, and he's driving a car prepared by the team owned by legend A.J. Foyt, who is one of three drivers to win the iconic race four times.

Kanaan — one of the most popular drivers among the sport's fans, who call him "T.K." — has been fast all month. He starts 10th in the 33-car field at the 2 1/2-mile Indianapolis Motor Speedway.

Kanaan also topped the speed chart in the final practice on a warm, clear Friday with a lap of 227.791 mph. The temperature for race day is expected to be about 90 degrees.

"This is the closest we were going to get as far as weather for Sunday, so we tried to optimize that (Friday)," he said.

Former Indy 500 winner Scott Dixon was second-fastest, followed by Marco Andretti, Sebastien Bourdais and Charlie Kimball.

"If you haven't figured it out by (Friday), you're in trouble," Kanaan said. "So we just went through some exercises, gave the boys some pit stops, refueling, trying to gauge the fuel mileage and so on."

Kanaan's car carries the No. 14 that Foyt used during his career, and Kanaan acknowledged that carrying the number "is a big thing here."

"It's a lot of pressure," he told reporters

Thursday. "At this point in my career, I didn't think I would have that much pressure after winning everything I wanted to win. But, yeah, (the number) adds to it."

Kanaan also has been a mentor to his Brazilian teammate, rookie Matheus Leist.

"To be here at Indy with A.J. Foyt as an owner and Tony Kanaan as a teammate, it's something I never thought would happen," said Leist, 19.

Leist qualified 11th and will take the green flag alongside Kanaan in the fourth row under Indy's unique starting format of 11 rows of cars, three wide.

Despite Foyt's record at the Brickyard, his team has struggled at Indy for most of the last decade. Kanaan, who joined Foyt's team this season after four years with Chip Ganassi Racing, hopes to change that.

"They hadn't been very successful the last few years," Kanaan said of A.J. Foyt Racing. "I think I've bumped it up and I brought a few people with me — my engineer, my mechanics."

Kanaan won the IndyCar series championship in 2004. But before 2013 he had made 11 unsuccessful attempts to win the Indy 500, which made him a sentimental favorite when he finally reached Victory Lane in the sport's signature event.

He knows speed alone isn't enough to win, that flawless pit stops, a car that doesn't break down, sound strategy and a sizable dose of luck are also required.

"I'm always comfortable (and) I always know what I've got" with the car, Kanaan said. "If it goes right, we have a pretty good chance."

"Whatever happens Sunday, it's going to be up to us to make it happen."

# Kyle Busch has 1 goal in mind

Charlotte is only track where he has yet to win points race

CONCORD, N.C. — Kyle Busch has won a Cup points race at every track on the NASCAR circuit except Charlotte Motor Speedway.

Twenty-eight starts, no checkered flags — and plenty of frustration.

Busch, 33, is looking to check off that final box on his racing resume Sunday in the Coca-Cola 600, considered a crown-jewel race in NASCAR. He will start from the pole position in the No. 18 Toyota, just as he has twice before at this track.

Bad breaks — often entirely out of his control — have kept him from making a trip to victory lane in Cup races and have become a source of irritation for him.

"It's important to me, but I'm not sure it's important in the grand scheme of things," Busch said Thursday after turning a lap of 191.836 mph on the 1 1/2-mile track. "It's certainly important to me and I would love to get that knocked out of the way and to be finished with it until another new track comes up on the circuit."

Busch is quick to point out that he has won a Cup race at Charlotte — he captured the All-Star race in 2017 and the \$1 million prize that came with it. But the All-Star race is an exhibition and does not count toward season points.

"The last time I checked I have a trophy at home that says, 'winner at Charlotte Motor Speedway,' so I'll take that to my grave with me if I do never get a points win here," Busch said.

This could be the year that Busch gets it done. He's the Cup points leader with nine top-10 finishes and seven top-fives in 12 starts. He also has won three races.

His chief competitor, Kevin Harvick, who has a series-best five Cup victories,

will start at the back of the field after failing inspection three times before qualifying.

"You can only do so much with the stuff you have, and everybody at Joe Gibbs Racing has been doing a great job and working hard to put together some better stuff every week to get us closer to those other guys who are a bit faster," Busch said. "That's all we can do is put our heads together and make the most of it."

Busch has had bad luck at Charlotte. In 2013, a Fox Sports cable camera broke and fell on the track from overhead in the first half of the race with Busch leading. The nylon rope severely damaged his car, which was traveling at 195 mph.

Busch has mostly good thoughts about coming to Charlotte, where he has won eight Xfinity and seven Truck series races.

"This is a race that you always enjoy coming to at Charlotte," Busch said. "Overall with the speed in our race car right now, once you get the balance right, the car has speed."



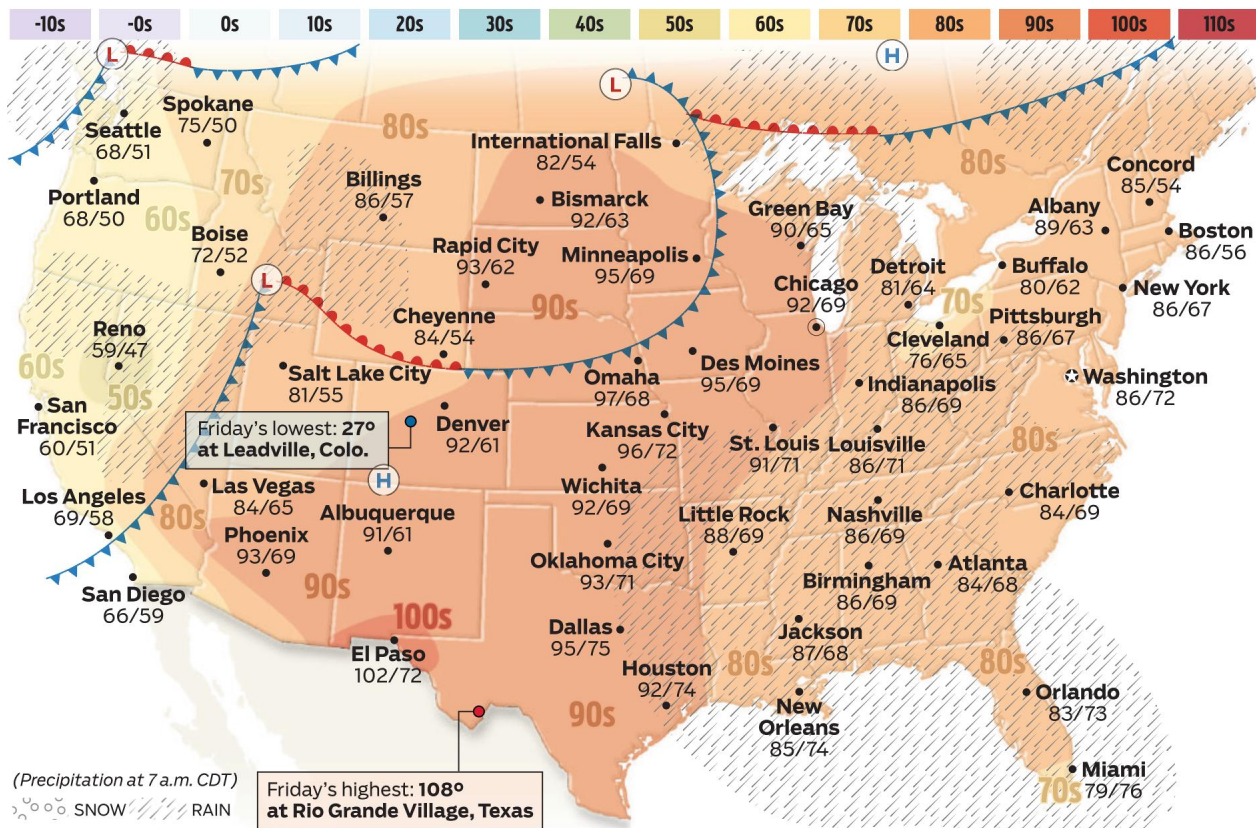
## Sudden summer with string of 90s on the way

The weekend is expected to be dry, though an isolated thunderstorm could pop up Saturday evening. Subtropical storm Alberto is expected to bring heavy rains to Florida and the Gulf Coast.

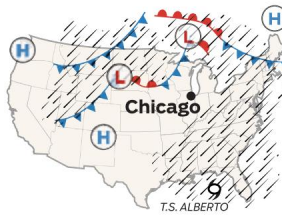

What was the strength of the Alaskan earthquake on Good Friday 1964?

Dear Melinda,  
The March 27 (Good Friday), 1964, Alaskan earthquake had a strength of 9.2 on the Richter scale. It was the most powerful earthquake to strike North America and the second most powerful in the world. It lasted 4 minutes and 30 seconds, and released 200,000 megatons of energy.

Anchorage suffered massive damage. Portions of the city's downtown district sank 20 feet, and 130 acres of suburban Turnagain Heights sank into the sea. The coastal town of Valdez was devastated by a combination of the earthquake, mudslides and a tsunami. Miraculously, only one death resulted. There are no high buildings in Anchorage, and the population in Alaska is relatively low: 298,000.

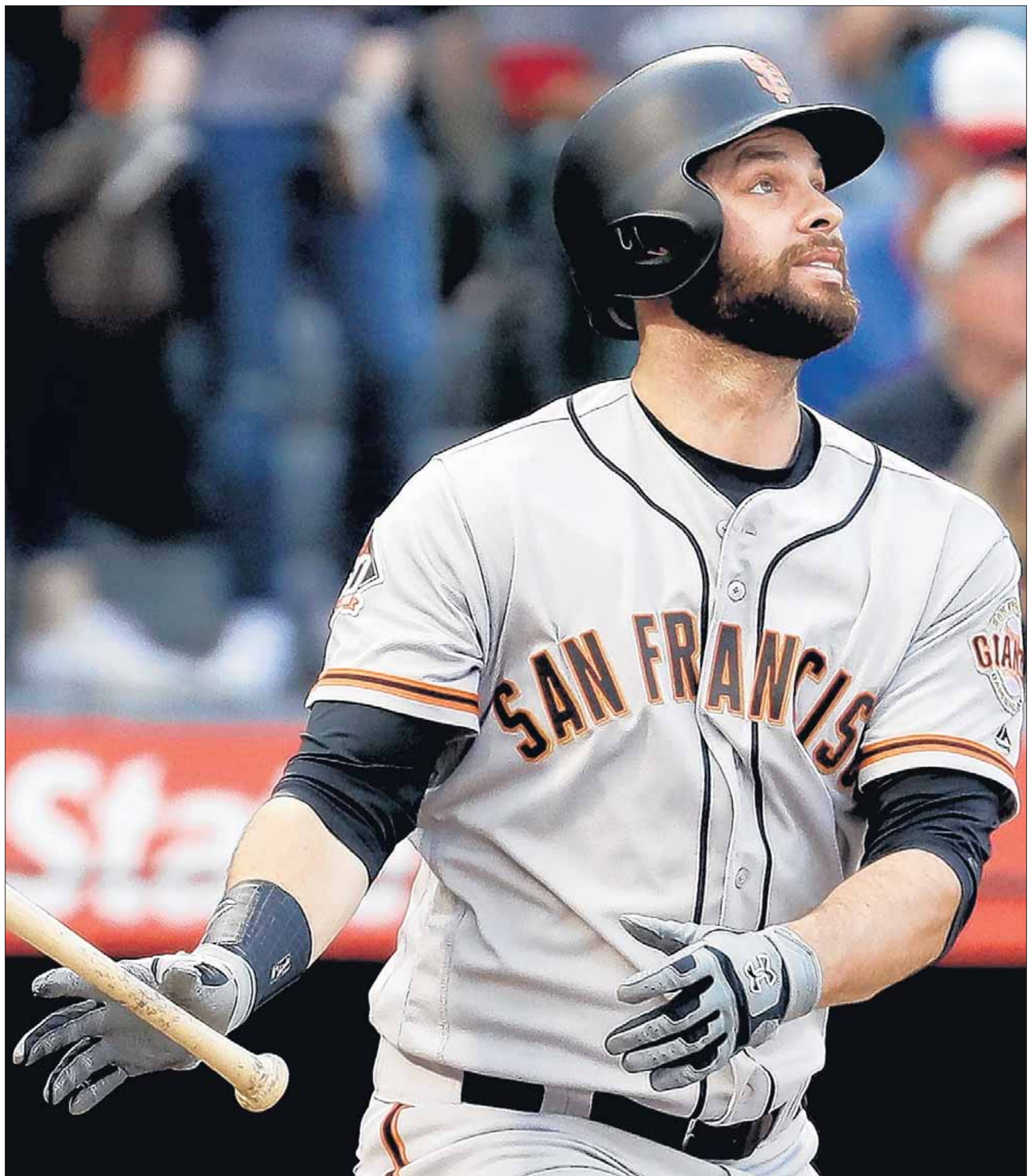

## Belt anonymous no more

Optimal production lifts Giants 1B out of shadows, into limelight

HOUSTON — If there is a natural hiding spot for an elite hitter to remain a well-kept secret, playing first base for the Giants is the perfect post to take cover.

Start with the position.

The National League is loaded with name-brand talent at first base. Joey Votto is a five-time All-Star and the face of the franchise for the Reds. The Diamondbacks' Paul Goldschmidt has finished in the top three of NL MVP voting three times in the last five years. The Dodgers' Cody Bellinger is the reigning rookie of the year and a star in one of baseball's biggest markets.

Five other NL first basemen — including 2016 World Series champion Anthony Rizzo of the Cubs and the Padres' \$144 million man, Eric Hosmer — have been named to All-Star teams.

Then consider the franchise.

The Giants own three World Series titles this decade, thanks in large part to a vaunted pitching staff led by Madison Bumgarner and a remarkable run of excellence from catcher and 2012 NL MVP Buster Posey.

Baseball fans around the world look at the Giants and see a roster composed of Gold Glovers and past All-Stars, even if many of the most recognizable faces are nearly past their prime.

Examining the ballpark is a worthwhile endeavor too. AT&T Park is a pitcher's paradise, and unless your name is Barry Bonds, the stadium wasn't designed with the talents of a left-handed hitter in mind.

Nearly every factor is working against Brandon Belt becoming a star. Yet 51 games into the 2018 season, he was the most valuable hitter in the National League.

Belt isn't just on pace to earn his second career All-Star nod. He's outperforming every player in his division and is thriving as the unlikely offensive catalyst leading the NL West's best offense.

"I think this is the best year I've had so far," Belt said. "I think this is what I felt like I could always do. It's just a matter of being consistent with it, and I've got to continue to do the same thing."

While stunning and sudden, Belt's emergence is also paradoxical.

The most recent NL Player of the Week recipient crushed five homers in sev-

en games to help the Giants to a winning homestand and consistently elicited rousing ovations from AT&T Park crowds.

But throughout his eight-year major-league career, Belt has dealt with constant rousing of criticism and defiant dismissals of his talent from many of those same fans. The most vocal detractors painted Belt as an oft-injured, always underwhelming hitter with a penchant for whiffing — or worse, taking — in clutch situations.

Belt's soaring home run in the 18th inning of Game 2 of the 2014 NL Division Series against the Nationals propelled the Giants to a series upset, but the first baseman has long been chided for what fans perceived as "warning-track power."

At 30, a slight adjustment to Belt's swing has keyed an offensive breakthrough.

Over the offseason, Belt evaluated video from the best year of his career, 2016, and determined he needed to lower his hands if he wanted his swing to be quicker through the zone.

The results have placed the rest of baseball on notice.

"This is what I thought I was going to be able to do before the season started," Belt said. "Just a lot of experience and stuff and the physical part is kind of meeting up this year and I

feel like I can keep going."

Belt isn't leading the NL in home runs, RBIs, batting average or on-base percentage. Yet other metrics say he's the best the league has to offer.

His 175 weighted runs created plus, a measurement that adjusts for park effects, led all NL hitters through Tuesday. The league average was 100.

His 1.006 OPS ranked second to Cubs third baseman Kris Bryant's 1.010, and his weighted on-base average of .424, a stat that contextualizes a hitter's offensive value, was two-tenths of a point behind Bryant's league-best mark. A wOBA of .400 is considered excellent.

"Brandon has just really picked up his play this year," manager Bruce Bochy said. "You could see it in spring training. I just thought between attitude and the little adjustment he's made in his swing, he's really become a force."

Belt's 2.4 wins above replacement — which has become perhaps the most common stat used to determine a player's value — was the best in the NL and a full 0.7 ahead of Rockies third baseman Nolan Arenado. It was a smidgen in front of Diamondbacks center fielder A.J. Pollock's 2.3 mark, but Pollock won't have a chance to catch Belt in the near future because of a recently fractured wrist.

Belt credits a deeper lineup for creating better opportunities for him at the plate this year, but his manager and teammates know Belt is responsible for taking matters into his own hands.

No player on the Giants roster works a count like Belt, and his 25 hits with two strikes led all NL players through Tuesday.

"I feel more comfortable deeper in the count this year than I have in the past," Belt said. "Definitely. I think I feel comfortable at any point in time. Maybe I get later in the count and it might cause me to shorten up a bit and I might actually have a better approach at that point."

Hitting in the heart of an order that now ranks second in the NL in batting average and fourth in OPS is a testament to Belt's newfound confidence, which he admits hasn't always been his strength.

"When I come to the field every day, I feel like I have a good chance of getting a hit and helping us win a ballgame," Belt said.

"That hasn't always been the case. I have a lot of confidence right now, and maybe a mediocre stretch here and there is not going to take that away from me anymore."

After sitting out the final two months of the Giants' 98-loss campaign with a concussion, the promise of

personal accolades isn't necessarily driving Belt's breakout season. Like every other member of a well-compensated Giants core, it's clear Belt senses an obligation to will the club into contention in the NL West, a division that remains a wide-open race.

Should Belt continue to light up opponents with offensive fireworks, a national spotlight will eventually locate him.

Belt must maintain a narrow edge on Braves first baseman Freddie Freeman on statistical leaderboards to increase his odds of securing his first starting All-Star nod. He must withstand challenges from pitchers up in the zone, and as the season rolls on, he'll need to prove he has the durability to continue lifting the ball through a thick San Francisco marine layer.

His teammates believe he can.

"Getting on base and driving the ball obviously with a lot of home runs recently," shortstop Brandon Crawford said. "That's what we want and need out of him. I think he's probably one of the more underrated players in baseball."

With 51 games in the books, Belt was the Giants' best player, the league's most productive first baseman and quite possibly its most valuable hitter.

Underrated is a label that can only last for so long.

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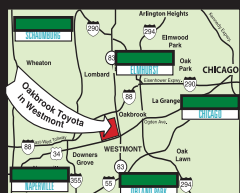

# Genesis G90: Luxe opening act

The first thing you need to know about the Genesis G90 luxury sedan is that it's definitely not a Hyundai. Even though it's made by Hyundai Motor Group.

Genesis is the young, high-end brand from the South Korean auto conglomerate, which has been careful to distinguish the luxury division from its more affordable Hyundai and Kia lines of sedans and sport utility vehicles. The full-size G90 is the nameplate's flagship vehicle, a stately ride that tops out around \$75,000 and comes loaded with luxury and technology features you won't find in an Elantra.

And if, by mistake, you call the G90 a Hyundai in conversation with Erwin Raphael, Genesis' general manager in the U.S., he will correct you. He noted my gaffe, at least.

I sensed Raphael was accustomed to this. He took it in stride, breezily pointing out the inaccuracy — but it felt as though he couldn't let the error slide. I imagine others could make the same mistake, and not because the G90 seems economical, but simply because the Genesis brand is only 2 years old.

And that's part of Genesis' challenge: to educate consumers about its existence, while keeping a safe distance from Hyundai and the residue of unreliability that clings to the marque, which entered the stateside market in 1986 with cars plagued by quality issues.

Those problems were dealt with years ago — aided by Hyundai famously offering a 10-year/100,000-mile powertrain warranty — and now the company is known for producing well-made and dependable vehicles.

But just a whiff of shoddiness, even if it is by association, could taint the rollout of a brand that's asking consumers to drop Mercedes-Benz money on a car from South Korea, which never before has sent such a pricey car to America and whose cars have yet to attain the prestige of European and Japanese rivals.

In a way, Genesis is trying to accomplish what Lexus did in the early 1990s, when the Toyota Motor Corp.-owned company upended the U.S. luxury car market with its LS400 sedan.

That car, which bowed in 1989, was priced well below its competitors and offered Japanese reliability alongside new features such as an automatic tilt-and-telescoping steering wheel and power-adjustable seat belts. These doodads may seem quaint now, but the LS400 stood out and quickly outsold many rivals.

In the G90, Genesis has an effective opening offering in the luxury marketplace — one that is less expensive than most of its entrenched competitors while including many of the same advanced features found in those rides, some of which have been playing in this moneyed space for decades.

Approaching our test vehicle, a 2018 G90 5.0 Ultimate edition that cost \$72,825, I was struck by this: It certainly looks credible. The sedan has a muscular grace, which is most effective at the rear, where its high belt line, brawny haunches and swooping, vertical taillights mesh nicely.

Inside are ribbons of wood and chromed surfaces, and lots of technology, such as a 12.3-inch screen that displays all manner of information, including a 360-degree exterior view of the car that's beamed from an array of cameras. It makes parking in tight spaces a cinch.

Behind the wheel, the rear-wheel drive G90 is refined, equally comfortable on L.A.'s scarred city streets and freeways. The distinguishing element of the Ultimate version is its V-8 engine, which generates 420 horsepower and propels the car to 60 mph in an estimated 5.3 seconds.

The car is faster than it needs to be. And yet, even at speed, it's impressively quiet inside the cabin. A sharp stab of the throttle does generate some noise indicating there is internal combustion happening somewhere in the vicinity, but the experience is otherwise serene.

When the Lexus LS400 debuted nearly 30 years ago, it was knocked for aping some of the design and engineering elements of competing vehicles such

as the Mercedes-Benz S-Class, whose uncompromising — albeit stolid — approach to luxury has made it an industry leader for years. Now, the G90 is the latest luxury interloper, and this time it's the Lexus LS (among others) that looks to be the subject of some mimicry.

I asked Raphael about the issue of imitation. He pushed back, even as I noted that, for starters, the Genesis logo looks a lot like Bentley's winged emblem.

"If you thought about it, you could probably come up with four or five car brands with wings," he suggested.

I asked Raphael about the styling similarities between the G90 and other cars. "We certainly don't benchmark — we don't even like using the word," he replied. "If somebody sees a line or a light or a handle that looks like another car, I don't really take much from it."

Still, I wanted to get some seat time in the new-for-2018 Lexus LS500 for the sake of comparison. The base LS500 starts at \$76,219, which is within range of a G90 Ultimate optioned with all-wheel drive. But it was tough to make an apples-to-apple comparison with the LS that Lexus lent me — an options-laden hybrid version that cost nearly \$105,000. (Among the niceties were surprisingly effective massaging front seats, which are part of a \$12,270 luxury package; such thrones aren't available in the G90.)

There are areas where the G90 excels. Its voice command system was superior to the one in the Lexus, never once flubbing one of my demands, expertly routing me via the navigation system to places with tricky names — among them the restaurants Musso & Frank and Republique.

Over the course of a few days, I happened to be having lunch at both of those eateries with exactly the sort of people Genesis would like to convert into paying customers: Hollywood executives. I surmise this because in March, the brand co-hosted the Vanity Fair Toast party, a pre-Academy Awards soiree held at Spago, and deployed a fleet of specially outfitted G90s for use by stars during the week leading up to the Oscars.

After one lunch, I asked my two dining companions to check out the G90. As a curious valet attendant hovered nearby, one of my tablemates, a millennial, said that she didn't know who made the car but that it was beautiful. She offered — after being told that Genesis was Hyundai's new high-end nameplate — that she had a positive impression of the company and considered it a maker of solid autos.

Her colleague, a middle-aged man, knew exactly what the G90 was, and praised it, saying he'd considered buying one. But in the end, he had opted to lease a Mercedes-Benz.

And that's a conclusion I suspect some prospective G90 buyers will reach, settling on a brand not only with decades of success but also — and perhaps most importantly — with an image that connotes wealth and sophistication in a way that few new nameplates could.

However, the G90's U.S. sales show that Genesis is convincing plenty of consumers. Last year, 4,398 G90s were sold here, besting the Audi A8, Jaguar XJ and the outgoing Lexus LS460.

The G90 was handily outsold by the BMW 7-Series (9,276) and Mercedes-Benz S-Class (15,888). And this year, the new LS500 is off to a better start than the G90, according to data provided by Genesis.

There's a tendency to want to label Genesis a plucky upstart — and, with that in mind, peg the G90 as a superb first effort.

With the G90, Genesis has mostly nailed it.

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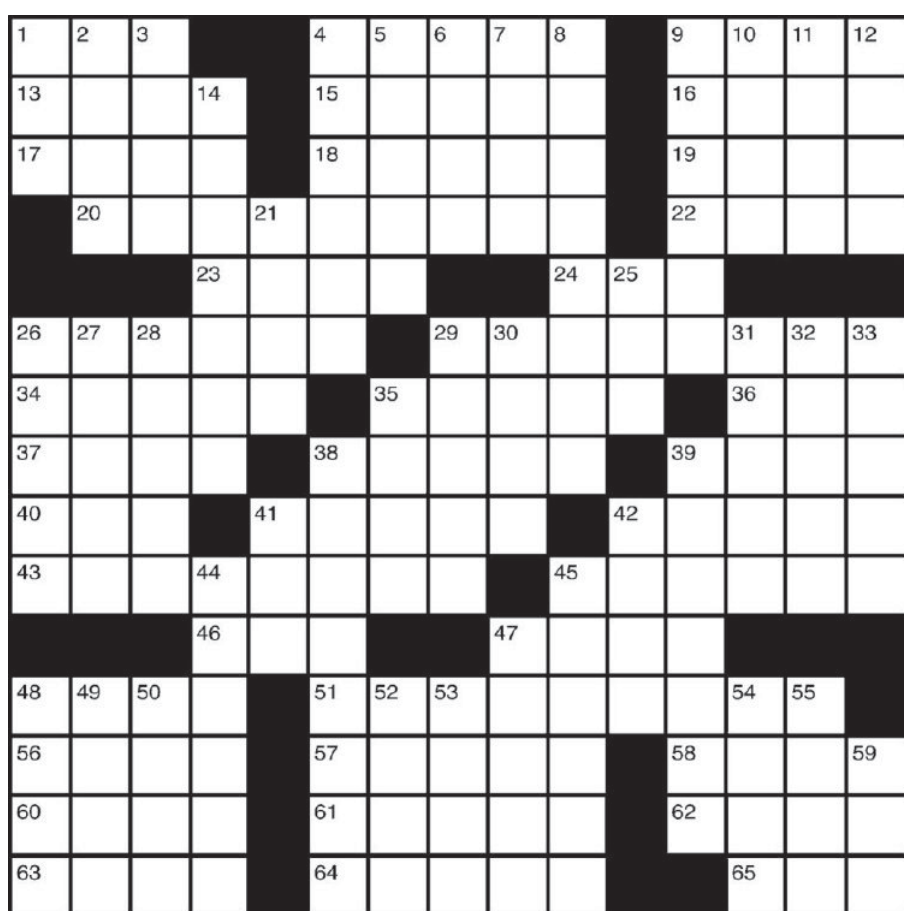
